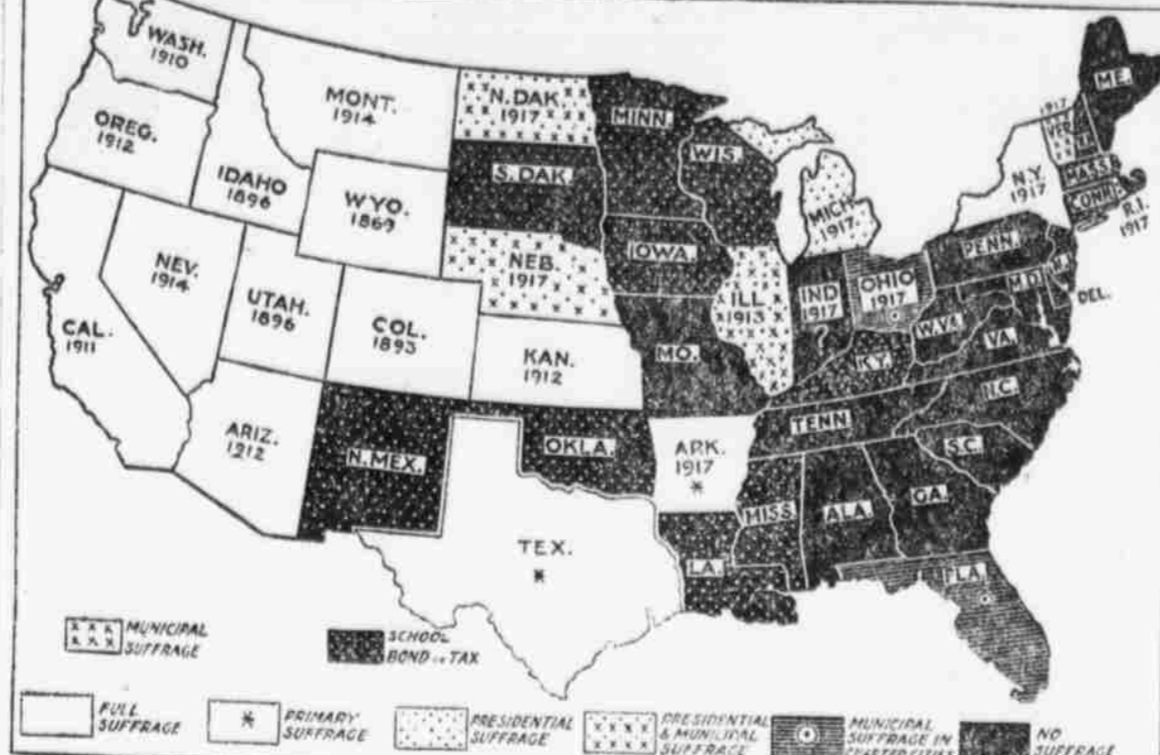
Against "Rule by Murder" I do not hesitate to say I am unwilling to abide by a political verdict when it is made to rest on blood.
