Although the majority of the track critics of the East believe that the special 100-yard race of the annual University of Pennsylvania relay carnival billed for the last Friday and Saturday of this month will be won in not better than 10 1/2 seconds, there are a few who expect the winner to break the tape in ten seconds flat and possibly a fraction under even time.

It is interesting to note that only a few very fast hundreders have been turned in at the Penn relays. In fact, Arthur Duffey, the speedster, who formerly was the champion of Georgetown University, is the only sprinter who has beaten ten seconds at the relay carnival. In 1906 and in 1907 Duffey won the event in the exceptionally fast time of 9 3/4 seconds.
