

EXPECT U. S. TO SEIZE FINNS' \$14,500,000

Cash Sent to Buy Food Is Sequestered in New York Banks

AWAITS END OF STRIFE

Success of Faction Backed by Germany May Invite Interference

Washington, April 15.—Deposition of a fund of \$14,500,000, deposited in the National City Bank of New York, to the account of the Government of Finland, is expected soon to become the subject of serious consideration by the United States Government as a result of repeated White Guard successes over the Bolshevik army in the Finnish civil war.

AWAITING DEVELOPMENTS

While the White Guard representatives today show any intention to submit to demarcation from Berlin when order is re-established, it is not likely that the United States will place any faith in such utterances, preferring to let the White Guard show by their actions whether or not they have been able to keep free of entanglements with German officials.

WHITE GUARD ENVOYS

The White Guard representatives in America are Karl Ignatius, a wealthy lawyer of Helmsfors, and Dr. J. J. M. M. M., an international authority on children and other ancient languages. For several months they held forth in a suite at the Willard Hotel in Washington but are now said to be in New York.

AMERICANS AT THE FRONT PROVE THEMSELVES SOLDIERS

Third Occupation in "Another Portion of Lorraine" Signalized by a Successful Brush With Party of Boches

UPON my map of the western front, I have the battle line outlined in tiny flags with pins for flagstaffs. They show the colors of France, England, Belgium and Portugal, with today the third set of pink portraying the stars and stripes. For we now have troops at three points—north of Toul, at Chemin des Dames and, following information given publicly today, "in another portion of Lorraine," or, if you prefer recent words of Secretary Baker, "northwest of Toul."

It is a fact that the results of nine months' work in beginning to appear, and that our boys are on the job, there to stay until, with France, England, Belgium and Portugal, victory comes to our allied arms.

Full of "Pop" and Confidence

I cannot, through some mysterious failing of the censor, say whence come these three third-occupation American troops. But with the other two contingents in their trunks, they went in full of eager desire to get at the Boche, a song upon their lips until the hour and the place demanded silence for the Boche has sharp ears and constantly holds them to the ground.

Boches Quickly Mastered

Parties went out upon patrol as if going upon patrol had been an ancient habit, their beginning the tread of No Man's Land coming within three hours after occupation. In no case was one, and that after several nights in the line, did they encounter the Boche, but that instance was in its small way noteworthy.

THREE SOLDIERS DIE IN TRAIN WRECK

19 Others Seriously and 60 Slightly Injured When Five Cars Leave Rails

Central Islip, L. I., April 15.—Three soldiers were killed, nineteen were seriously injured and about fifty were slightly hurt early today when five cars of a Long Island train were derailed two miles east of this place.

All the injured were taken to the Central Islip State Hospital and those less seriously hurt were conveyed to New York on trains rushed to the scene of the wreck. The train, made up of thirteen cars, was running at more than fifty miles an hour when it was derailed. Five cars were derailed. The wreckage caught fire. Two of the cars rolled down a steep embankment.

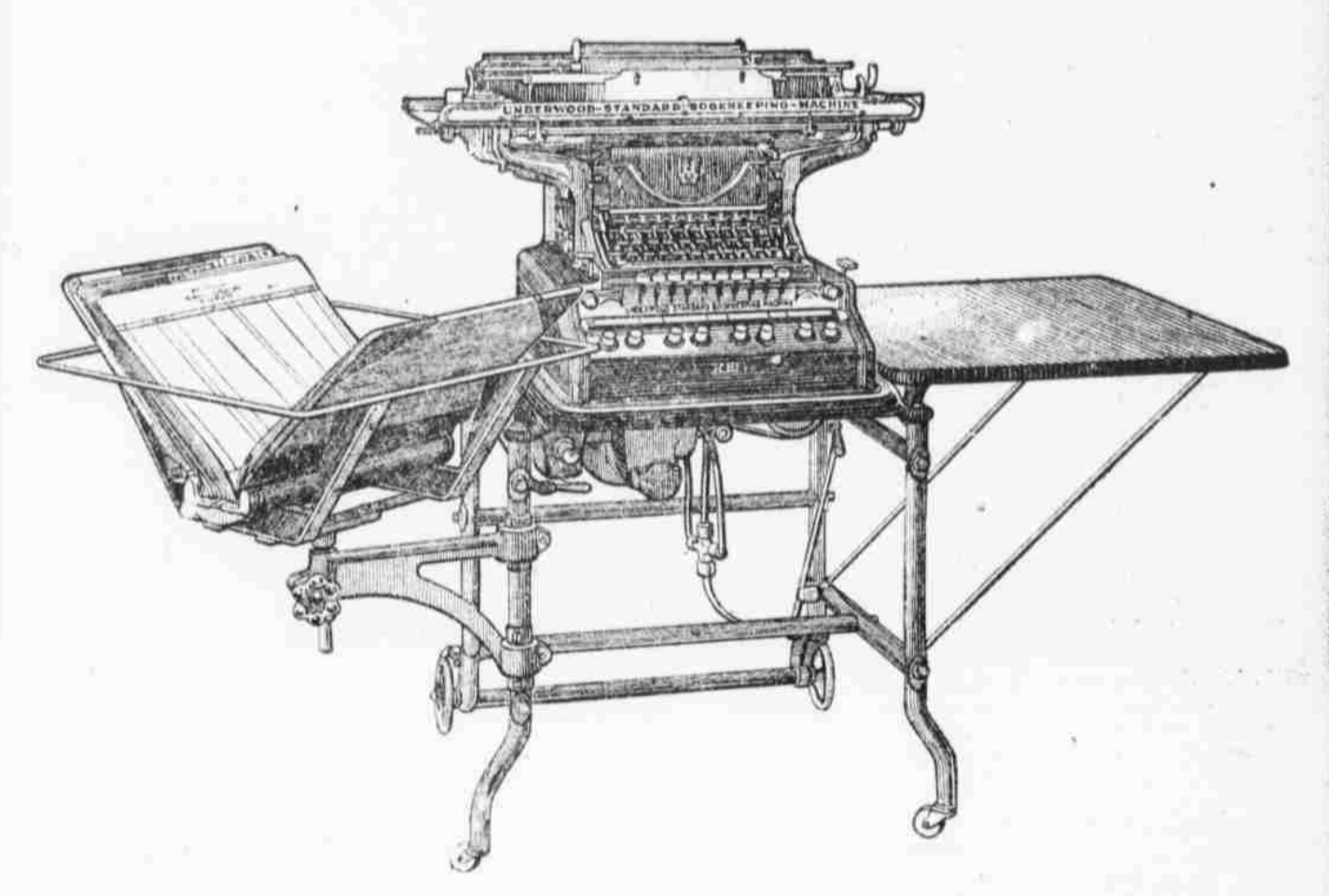
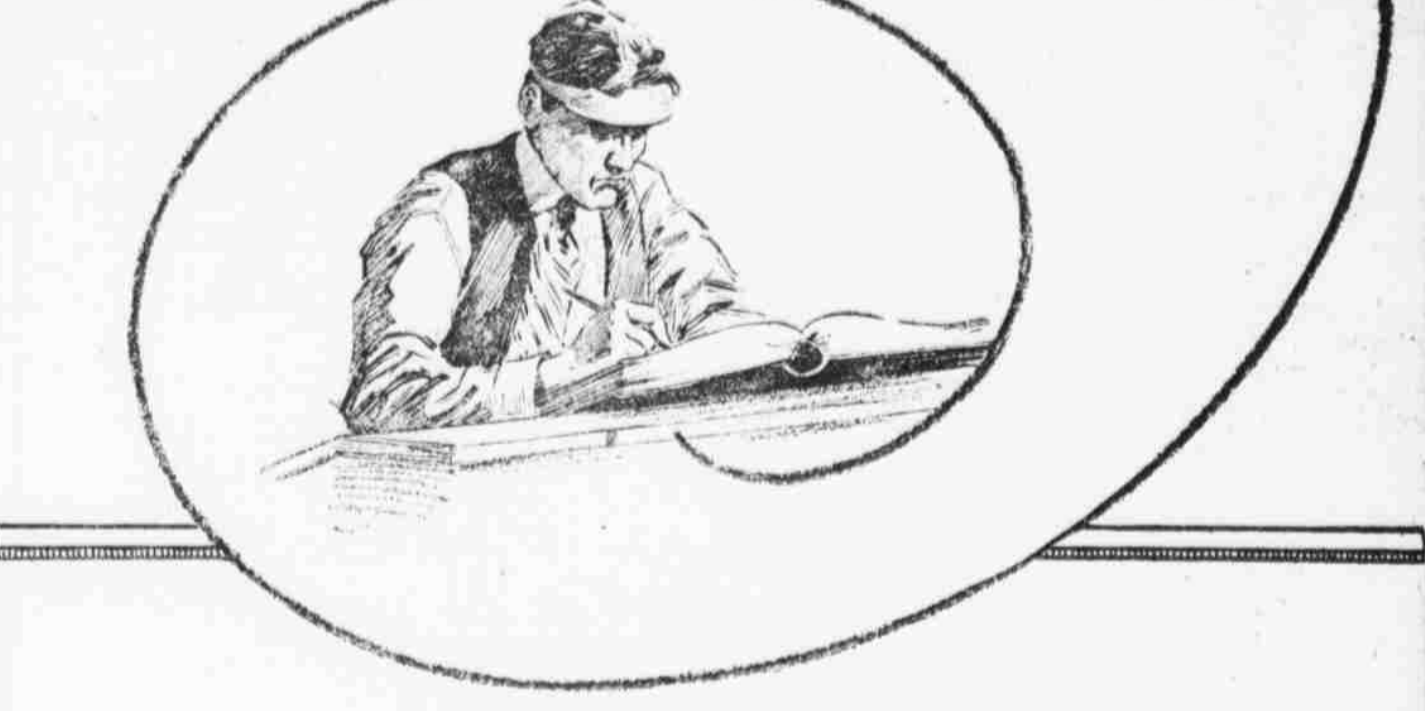
15000 Bail for Alleged Robber
