CHAMBERLAIN NOW FAVORS OVERMAN BILL

FREIGHT CONGESTION REDUCED IN EAST

Only Trouble Existing Due to Rushing of War Supplies MORE CARS FOR COAL Shortage of Ships Still Hampers Unloading at Eastern Terminals Washington, April 25.—Railroad congestion in the East has been reduced almost 50 per cent, and what more spots exist today are due to the rush of supplies to the railroad terminals for the military needs of the United States and the Allies, according to figures made public by the United States railroad administration. Reports received from Regional Director A. H. Smith stated that the above normal car supply in the eastern territory was 25,296, as compared to 27,000 on January 15.

LAKE ERIE RAILROAD SHOPS SWEEP BY FIRE

Arrest Made After Suspicious Blast, Destroys Five Units of Plant, Loss \$800,000 Lima, O., April 25.—After a terrific five-hour fight, a fire which swept through the big Lake Erie railroad shops was controlled early today and circumstances discovered which indicated incendiarism. Five units of the shops were wiped out, with loss estimated between \$600,000 and \$800,000.

POOLING OF SHIPPING OF ALLIES PROPOSED

Plan for Joint Board to Control All Movements of Vessels TO SETTLE PRIORITIES With 25,000,000 Tons Shipping Available, Co-ordinated Control Would Relieve Shortage Washington, April 25.—The pooling and operation by an international shipping board of all tonnage now operated by the United States, Great Britain, France and Italy is being jointly discussed by these nations. Distribution of tonnage, as the war sweeps into its most desperate stage, is becoming more and more a vital factor in the outcome. Differences of opinion as to whether food supplies or munitions should have priority have caused vast confusion in recent months with the rapidly changing situation in France. Official diplomatic advice today announced a meeting of the interrelated economic committees of France yesterday to discuss the question of tonnage distribution. The pool plan would bring the same co-ordination in the shipping shortage that was brought on the western front by the appointment of Foch as generalissimo of all Allied troops. The plan is to put control of the world's tonnage in the hands of an inter-allied board with authority to direct shipments of supplies, food, munitions and perhaps even troops. Probably 25,000,000 tons of shipping would be at the disposal of the board. The board would have authority to grant priority of shipments and to withhold shipments.

MARYLAND DRINKERS READY FOR "DRY" LAW

AUTO FREIGHT ROUTES PLANNED IN CLEVELAND

Network of Motor Lines to Carry Thousands of Tons of Goods Is Sought Cleveland, O., April 25.—A new scheme, which has the backing of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, gives a success, Cleveland will have the center of a network of inter-city freight lines, running on automobile and carrying many thousands of tons of short-haul freight which is now at the mercy of the nation's war-ridden railroad transportation system.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE BARRED

Connecticut Restrictions Aimed at Teaching of German Hartford, Conn., April 25.—No language other than English shall be used for elementary instruction in Connecticut for purchase in administration in public or private schools after July 1 under proclamation issued by Governor Holcomb. Restrictions are aimed at the German language.

NEWSPRINT SHORTAGE BEFORE PUBLISHERS

National Meeting Refers to Large Quantities of Paper Used in Government Bureaus New York, April 25.—The newsprint shortage was up for discussion at the annual convention of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association. The discussion of the eight-point law for second-class mail paper was also continued.

REPORT SHIP LOSS MONTHLY

London, April 25.—The cessation of returns of shipping losses from the submarines of a monthly report on the Thursday following the date of each month is announced by the Admiralty.

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
