

CASUALTY LISTS CARRY 88 NAMES

Eighteen New Englanders With Pershing's Force Reported Killed

ADDRESSES ANNOUNCED

Washington, May 2. Losses among the New England division are revealed by today's casualty list issued by the War Department. The list is the first with the emergency addresses restored. It reports eighteen killed in action, two missing, one died of wounds, five dead of disease, two dead of accident, two wounded severely and fifty-eight wounded slightly.
