

Von Tirpitz Press Bureau

All the naval news goes to the Navy Departmen, where Admiral von Tirpitz had already organized a press bureau for propaganda purposes some years before the war. Scarcely any news about events at sea gets into the German papers except that officially issued by the naval authorities themselves, who are exceedingly nervous and make a great mystery of all their proceedings.
