THERE is an old saying that the man who wins the medal in a qualifying round of a golf tournament rarely ever wins the tournament. Chick Evans won the gold medal for qualifying rounds in the national amateur championship three or four times, but not once did he win the championship. He won the title two years ago at the Merion Cricket Club, but he was not the medalist in that year.

They have not actually come out with a formal challenge but it is sort of understood at Merion that the two are ready to meet any time that would suit the latter's convenience. Another pair who are likely to take up the challenge are Norman Maxwell and Walter Reynolds of Aronimink. They have not actually met Risley and Knight on a number of occasions at the shore and with one solitary exception the Aronimink men have failed to come out the right side. Now that the turf is getting better and the players have more chance for practice we may expect to see some interesting matches between these three pairs.

Virtually the first golf tournament to be held in this section of the country goes to the honor of the Philadelphia Golf Club, which has its habitat on the public course of the Cobbs' Creek. It was a secondary affair and 225 players actually turned in scores, some indication of the popularity of the game on our lone public course. It was a kickers' tournament, in which every man selects his own handicap. Nearly \$500 dollars was collected.
