DRAFT LAW UPHELD
BY SUPREME COURT

Selected Men Can Be Sent Anywhere to Fight for United States

Washington, May 6. Men raised under the draft can be sent anywhere in the world to fight for the United States, the Supreme Court today decided.

The action of the court today upholds the selective draft law in every particular.

The right of Congress to conscript men for foreign service was attacked by Robert Cox, of Kansas City, drafted, sent to Camp Funston.

He asked for a writ of habeas corpus directing Major General Leonard Wood in command of the camp, to release him from service on the ground that there was no constitutional right to compel him to fight in foreign lands.

Chief Justice White, in announcing the decision, also denied the motion to hold General Wood in contempt for sending Cox to France while his case was pending.

The court also censured Cox's attorney for their briefs in the case, which the Government charged were "scandalous and seditious."

It was also asked that the brief be stricken from the court files.

"We find that the briefs were amendable to the Government's characterization, and the attorneys should be severely censured," said the Chief Justice, "but believe this can be done better by leaving them with the court instead of sending to cause reputation of such state-ments their very unwarranted character would tend to the contrary."

Deciding the constitutionality of the law, Chief Justice White said: "Congress is restrained, either directly or indirectly, in raising men by qualifications as to where they shall fight. The authority for conscription does not rest on the military laws of the Constitution or the old militia laws, but on the broad ground of powers the State delegated to the Federal Government by approving the Constitution."

CHARGES MACHINE GUN
PROGRAM IS FAILURE

Kuhn Alleges Colt Factory Production of Heavy Weapon "Ridiculously Small"

Washington, May 6. Production of heavy Browning machine guns has been a failure comparable only to the breakdown of the aircraft program, members of the House Military Affairs Committee declared today.

A military investigation of the failure has already been started, Dixon said, adding that a Congressional investigation is not delayed until the results of the present probe are known.

General Dixon placed the blame for the delay of the heavy guns on a "bad organization" of the Colt company, to the draft and other sources. Many of the company's skilled workers refused to claim execution, he said, although members of the committee failed to see why the percentage of men lost should be much higher with the Colt company.

Today's hearing revealed the Government has practically decided to abandon the contract system of contracts.

Appropriations for 220,000 machine guns for use on airplanes was asked by General Dixon. In addition, \$1,000,000 will be expended for incendiary bombs, indicating that the activities of the American aviators, although delayed, may be a potent force within the year.

Roma, 6 maggio.
Dalle notizie giunte dalla fronte di battaglia, confermate dal rapporto del Comando Supremo Italiano, si rileva che un aumento di intensità nel fuoco da parte dell'artiglieria tedesca si è verificato lungo quasi tutto il fronte, mentre nella Valli dell'Arno e Lagarina e nel settore di Fossalta.

L'artiglieria italiana ha effettuato numerosi bombardamenti con efficaci risultati, ed una intensa attività è stata compiuta dai caproni e dagli aeroplani italiani, durante il corso della quale otto macchine tedesche furono distrutte e parecchie fornellate di bombe fu scoperta sulle posizioni, sulle opere di difesa e sugli impianti nemici.

Una aumentata intensità nel formidabile fuoco avversario si è verificata nella Valli Lagarina e dell'Arno e nel settore di Fossalta.

La nostra artiglieria dispense ripetuti colpi nell'area dello Stivo, bersaglio di nostro interesse, e con successo, treni della stazione di Conca e capoli una forte esplosione, sulla parte opposta a Nervese. Altre due azioni di artiglieria, in ambas le parti, si verificarono tra il Brenta ed il Piave.

L'attività delle nostre aeronavi fu molto intensa. Vennero fatti due Caproni e ventotto biplani, protetti da numerose macchine da caccia, lasciarono la base di Biadene e Bolzano, bombardando i loro obiettivi di fronte a Salsomaggiore e Bolzano. I biplani italiani, con ottimi effetti, nel pomeriggio, si sono abbattuti sulla base di Salsomaggiore, distruggendo due macchine e due aerei, e due aerei italiani furono distrutti, due delle quali cadde in fiamme entro le nostre linee.

Un dispaccio da Livorno annunzia che l'Intesa aerea, accompagnata da parecchi all'ufficiali tedeschi ed austriaci, è giunto ieri l'altro al fronte italiano. Il dispaccio aggiunge che con l'arrivo di nuovi aerei, per lo più biplani, si è intensificata l'attività aerea italiana, e che da ora si deve presumere che in tanto predetta offensiva al fronte italiano dovrà immediatamente precipitare.

Attorno al Valtirono, interrogato circa la notizia che il Papa avrebbe fatto nuove offerte di pace per il giorno delle Pontecoste, hanno dichiarato che nessun favorevole occasione per un futuro accordo, non si è presentata attualmente, né credesi si potrà presto presentarsi.

Non è un segreto, replicarono le dette autorità, che il Papa da quando cominciò il suo pontificato si è interessato riguardo tre grandi questioni concernenti la guerra. Primo, per un pronto e pacifica soluzione del conflitto; secondo, per limitare più che fosse stato possibile l'estensione del conflitto ed i suoi orrori; terzo, di lavorare sulla vera via, in ogni propria occasione, per ristabilire la concordia e la fratellanza tra i popoli.

Amsterdam, 6 maggio.

WOULD ASSIST RUSSIA
World's Greatest Reform Coming There, Says Minister

The Rev. William Foster, a Baptist minister, formerly of Petrograd, at a meeting of the Methodist Episcopal Ministerial Association today, told thrilling tales of Russian persecution under the Czar.

"The greatest reform ever known will take place within the next few years in Russia, I believe," said Rev. Mr. Foster. "I believe a great movement should be started in America to aid."

He told of the manner in which he was persecuted by the old Russian government, which prohibited him from preaching, but gave permission to conduct prayer. So he put his sermons in the form of prayers. He was then exiled to Siberia, but later was allowed to come to the United States.

Mr. Foster recently organized a school at 320 Spring Garden street for Russian young men.
