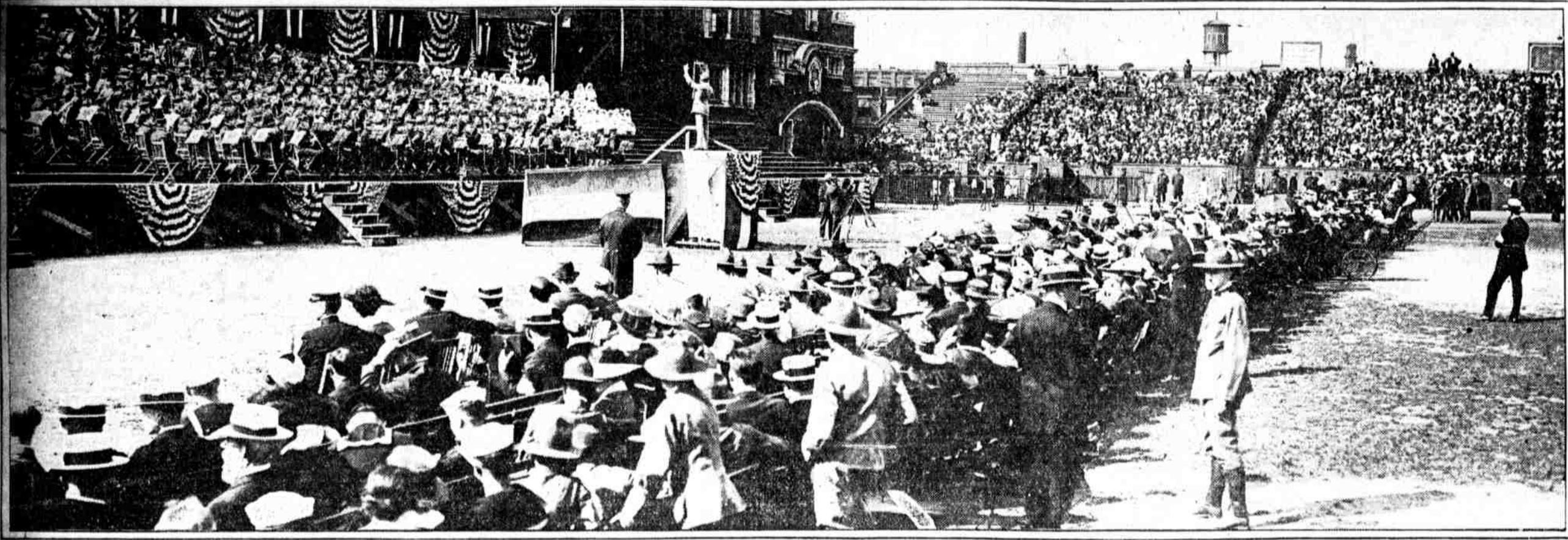

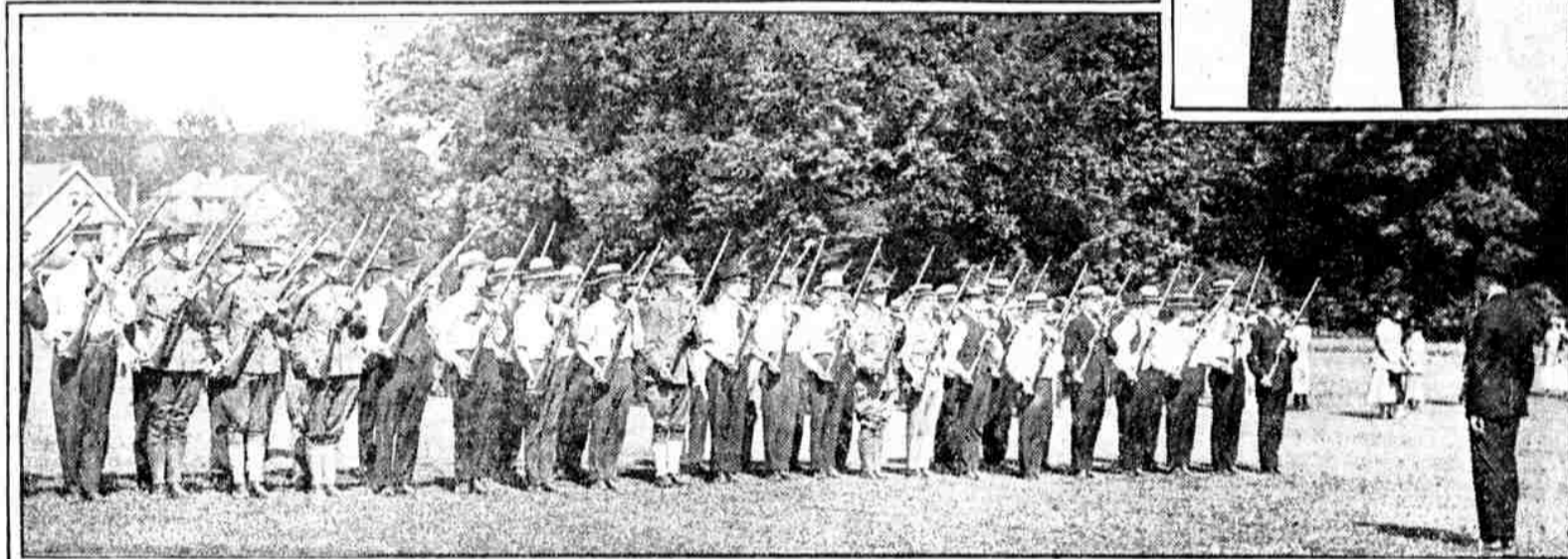
PHILADELPHIA PATRIOTIC SEVEN DAYS A WEEK, AS THE REVIEW OF SABBATH EVENTS ATTESTS



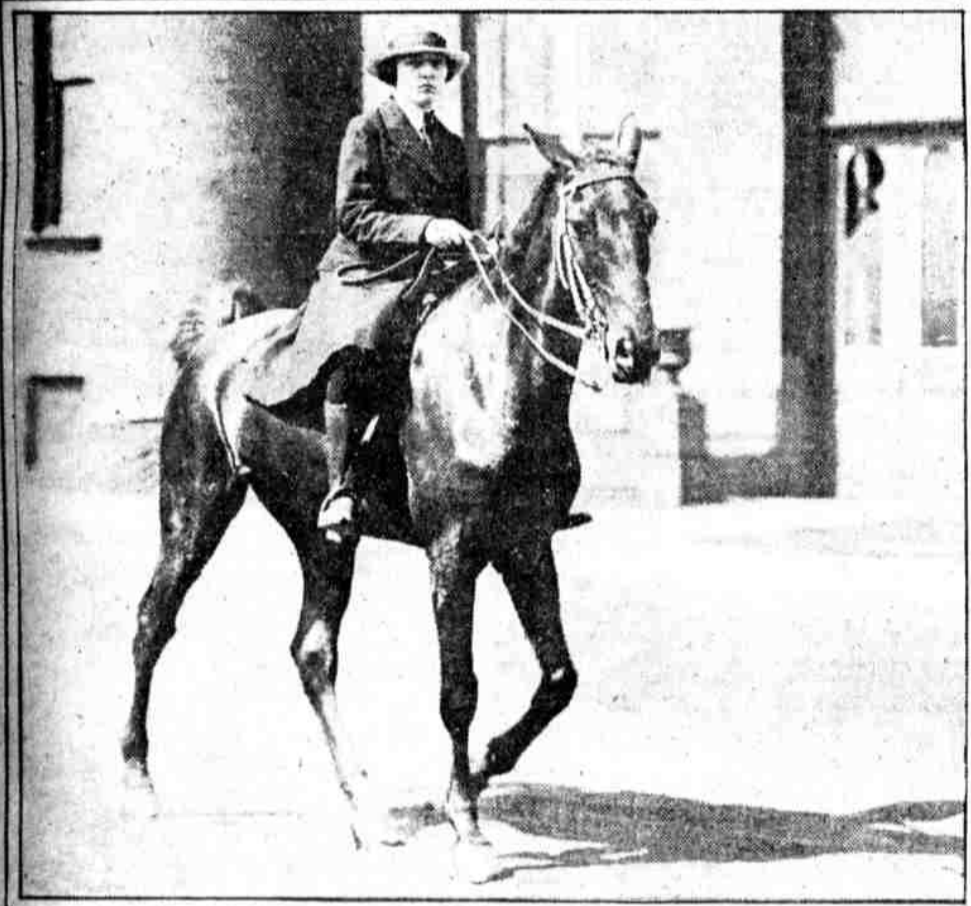
