President Signs Bill Drafting Men Who Have Passed Twenty-one AT BOTTOM OF CLASS 1

Wilson Issues Proclamation for Local Boards to Enroll Youths

Washington, May 21.—President Wilson has signed the bill which provides for the registration of 1,000,000 more men, who have reached the age of 21 since last June 5, to register for military duty on June 5 next. Within a few minutes after the President made the bill a law, Provost Marshal General Crowder had set in motion the machinery which will place approximately 700,000 more men in the uniform of the United States army.

The registration will be similar in every way to that conducted last year. Under the new law the men will be placed at the bottom of the list of men who are now listed in Class 1. In other words, they will not be called for service until the 1,000,000 or more already accepted have been called to the cantonments and completed training.

Proclamation Issued
The proclamation, issued today, says in part:
The time and place of registration shall be between 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. on the 5th day of June, 1918, at the office of the local board having jurisdiction of the area wherein he permanently resides, or at such other place as shall be assigned by public notice by such local boards.

May Register by Agent
"Any person who, on account of sickness, will be unable to present himself for registration, may apply on or before the day of registration at the office of any local board for instruction as to how he may register by agent."
"Any person who expects to be absent on the day designated for registration from the jurisdiction of the board in which he permanently resides may register by mail."
"Any person, on account of absence at sea, or on account of absence without the territorial limits of the United States, shall, within five days after reaching the first United States port, register with his proper local board."

MAYOR TO SUMMER HERE

Leases Atlantic City Home; to Live at Glenside, Near Dunes

RAILROAD HEAD OUSTED

McAdoo Orders Removal of President of Virginia Road

Washington, May 21.—Railways Director McAdoo's first drastic step to enforce the carrying out of ordered improvements was taken today when he directed that C. W. Huntington, president of the Virginia Railroad Company, with offices in New York city, withdraw from all corporate direction of the company. In his place the director appointed J. H. Young, president of the Norfolk and Southern Railway.

AMERICAN SOLDIER IS CLEANEST-LIVED

Allen D. Albert, War Camp Worker, Praises Morals of U. S. Army

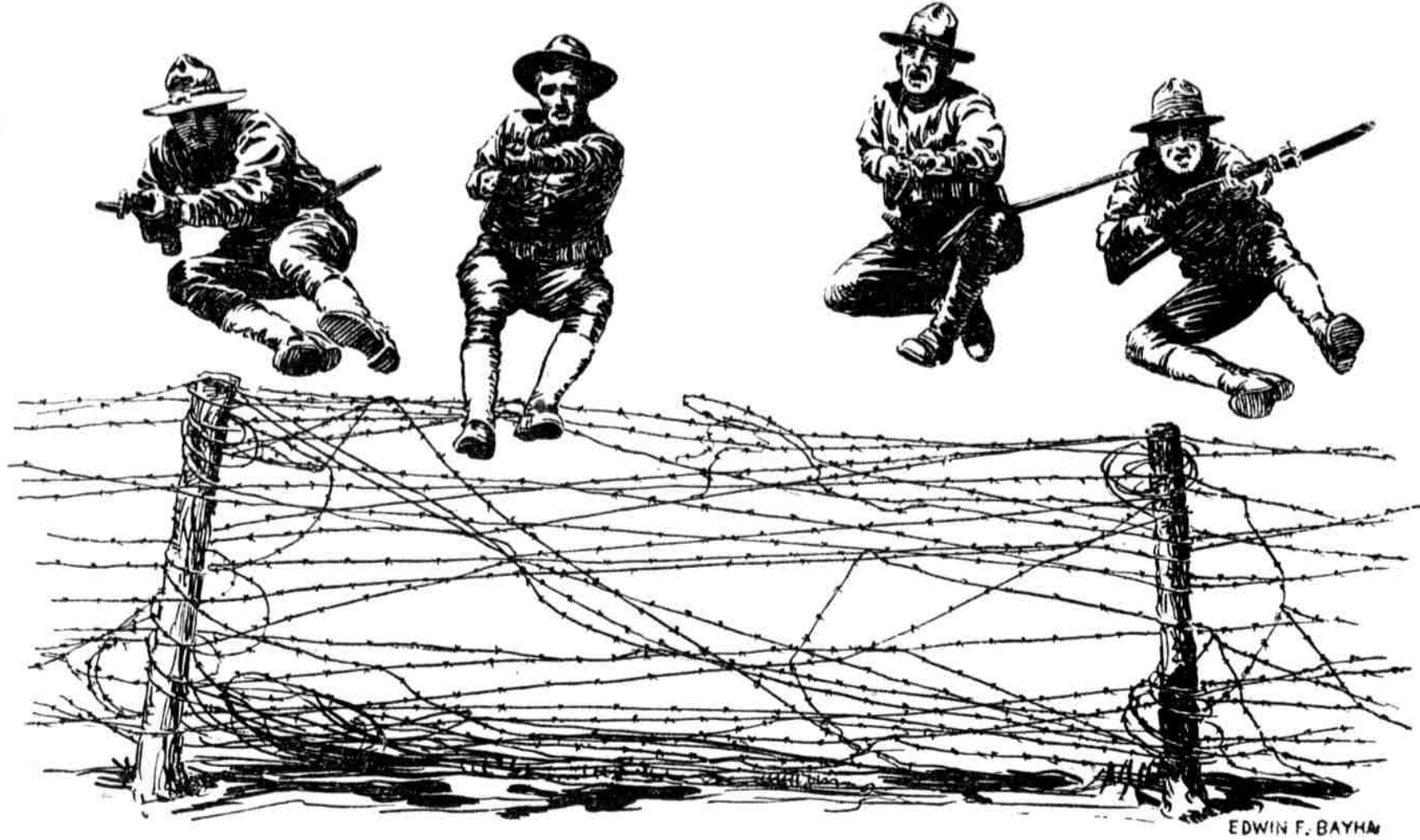
A world's record for clean living has been achieved by the United States army, which includes the Red Cross, according to a statement by Allen D. Albert, director of the public speaking bureau of the war camp community bureau, and official spokesman for the Foodstuffs commission, which recently caused a stir by branding Philadelphia as the "worst city" in providing protection from vice for the nation's fighting men.

The War Camp Community Service is one of the largest beneficiaries in the campaign, which includes the Red Cross, Knights of Columbus, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., Y. M. H. A., Salvation Army and other bodies working for the welfare of the fighters.
Philadelphia, of all the cities in the country, has offered the greatest opposition to the Government's efforts to make the American soldier the most of the world, declared Mr. Albert.
"And the wonder of it is that it came from most respectable sources," he said, "in telling us that the soldier's welfare work has been most understood and interpreted and attacked in an unfounded manner in this city."

Mr. Albert, who is here to boost the War Chest, said that through national cooperation between the Federal and city governments, conditions have been vastly improved within the last two months.
The splendid record of the American warrior was described at length by Mr. Albert. Outstanding figures for 100,000 soldiers in France, he said, showed that one per thousand were disabled by "southern contagion," whereas at one time the German army losses were 200 per thousand and the Austrian more than 500 per thousand. The United States army, he said, had prepared for 10,000 cases.

"Scarcely humanity the world over and you will find no equal to that record," said Mr. Albert. "It should silence those who yell about the mythical degradation of our boys in France."
"The United States has undertaken two enterprises beyond all other Governments in history. First, to render available for fighting more men per thousand than any other nation in the world which has already been accomplished; and second, to give these men a high survival value when the war ends. The men of any other nation in the world which, we believe, are accomplishing this."

"The Prussians in 1870 established a record for physical effectiveness in putting into action 720 men per thousand in uniform. The Japanese in the war with Russia surpassed this with 820 per thousand. We have available today about 920 to 940 per thousand men in the first draft in the United States and abroad. The usual figure is about one-third of the force engaged."
The United States, Mr. Albert said, has taken "booze and bad companions" away from the soldier, eliminating the danger and temptations to the men to leave by substituting wholesome pleasures described the Americans' "blight" in four French cities, which are polluted by the army. The Government has also won the first in history to stress science in safeguarding its troops by "pioneering" in communities adjacent to camps.
