Temperamental traits make themselves evident at an early age. Whether a child is a leader or a follower, a doer or an observer, an initiator or an imitator, it is for us to discern by careful observation, and then to provide guidance for his native traits.

EVERY individual has native, inherent tendencies which make up his individual personality. The sooner these tendencies are recognized by his parents, and the better these are understood, the more will there be of fewer disappointments, misadventures, and a greater amount of self-control and self-reliance.

It is not until the child is about three years of age that his temperamental traits become clearly evident. It is a very hard habit for the parent to acquire, but it is one that should be cultivated. It is the habit of observing the child's behavior and then to provide guidance for his native traits.
