He has defeated the Red Sox, White Sox and Cleveland without allowing them a score, These games bring the Washington pitcher's record up to seventy three shut-out contests since he has been in the American League.

Pitchers who have won two shut-out victories so far are Scott Perry Thormablen, Doc Ayers and Claude Williams. With the addition of se pitchers who have won one shut-out, the total for the season in the American League is thirteen players who have pitched ninetren scoreless
