
# PRESIDENT PLANS TO RAISE

WASHINGTON, May 27 .- President Wilson's war finance policy contemplates raising 40 per cent of new revenues by taxation and 60 per cent by bonds, it waslearned today. A memorandum, written by the President and given to Senator Simmons and Representative Kitchin, suggested this proportion by bonds and taxes to fnance the war. On this basis the new tax bll. expected to raise \$4,000,000,000 more than the present one, would augur a \$3,000,000,000 bond issue in the fail.


