

How the War Chest Fund Is to Be Disburse



First and above all, every dollar of the War Chest Fund will be devoted to war work alone The United States Government has selected certain national agencies as best fitted to carry on war work. Each of these national agencies has created a separate board to direct this work. The American Cross has its National War Council; the Y. M. C. A., its National War Work Council; the K. of C., its Tra Camp Commission; the Y. W. C. A., its National War Work Council, and the Y. M. H. A., its War Relief Board The national war board—by whatever name it may be known—of each organization, then decides what am necessary to do the work assigned to it by the Government, and asks the country as a whole for that sum.

Each State and large city is given its proper quota, based upon its population, banking resources, etc. only function of the War Chest Board, therefore, is to determine that the quota assigned to the five counties is just proportion to the total amount to be raised.

No part of the fund goes to any of the general work of these organizations, but it is applied wholly to

work approved by the United States Government.

There are, of course, a number of necessary local relief bodies, but they will require much smaller sums. It the case of such of these as desire to participate in the fund, the amount to be given to each will be appropriated by
