The front of the Winter Palace is reproduced, and so are the Nevsky Prospect, the stirring street scenes attendant upon the actual revolution in the capital, and the festival in the great hall in Petrograd, stranged for the trapping and the assassination of Rasputin. Noteworthy also is the reconstruction of the imperial railway train which bore the Car on his final journey from Petrograd to the summer palace at Tzarkoe-Selo, where the final scenes of dominion were staged.

Urges Conservation to Avoid Famine

Care in the use of ice as the only means of averting an ice famine this summer was urged today by Jay Cooke, food administrator for Philadelphia. At present, Mr. Cooke said, stored ice short 50,000 tons of the normal

"I desire to emphasize to the people of Philadelphia the necessity for con-serving ice this year; there must be material saving or the public will suffer."

Drug stores and other places where beverages are served are asked to use a minimum of ice in cooling. Hotels and restaurants are also asked to cut down on the lavish use of ice in serving down on the lavish use of ice in serving clams, grapefruit and other iced dishes. "Some practical suggestions to house-holders may not be out of place." Mr. Cooke said. "The iceman should not be kept waiting at the door while his wagon stands in the sun. The ice it contains is melting fast. The average ice wagon driver, if he lost a minute for each patron, would lose three hours in a day and perhaps a ton of ice.

WISE HOUSEHOLDERS ORDERING COAL NOW

Campaign Here, Says Fuel

The United States fuel administration designated the first week in June "coal week" and "fuel buying week," and instructed Federal fuel administrators of the several States to prosecute campaigns to stimulate coal buying to the end that supplies may be laid in during the summer against a shortage next winter.

There will be no such campaign in Philadelphia and Pennsylvania, however, because the people already are ordering as rapidly as could be wished. So said Francis A. Lewis, fuel administrator for Philadelphia today.

Philadelphia has always been rather foresighted in the matter of coal buying and even persons who have never distinguished themselves by frugality generally have stored up coal in their cellars, spring after spring and summer after summer for the succeeding winters.

Orders are being given this year in larger numbers than ever before and on every hand one finds persons who have ordered coal, but have yea received none or only parts of their orders.

"There is no necessity for a campaign to stimulate ordering," said Mr
