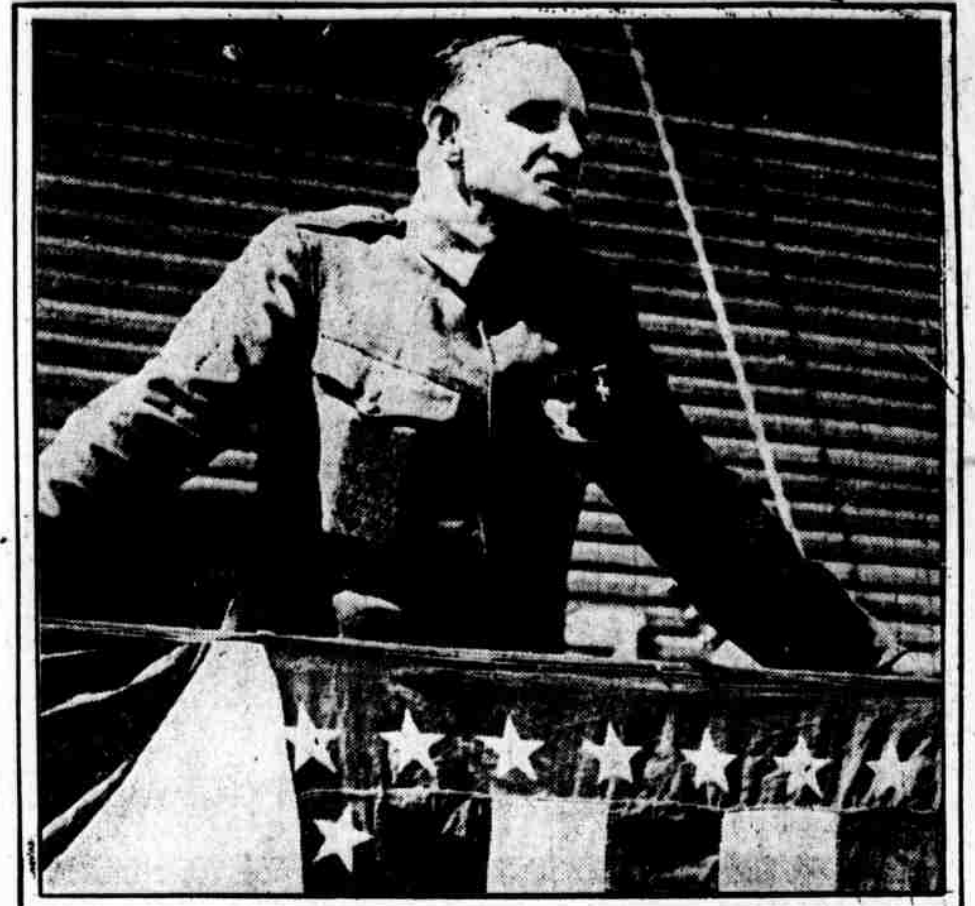
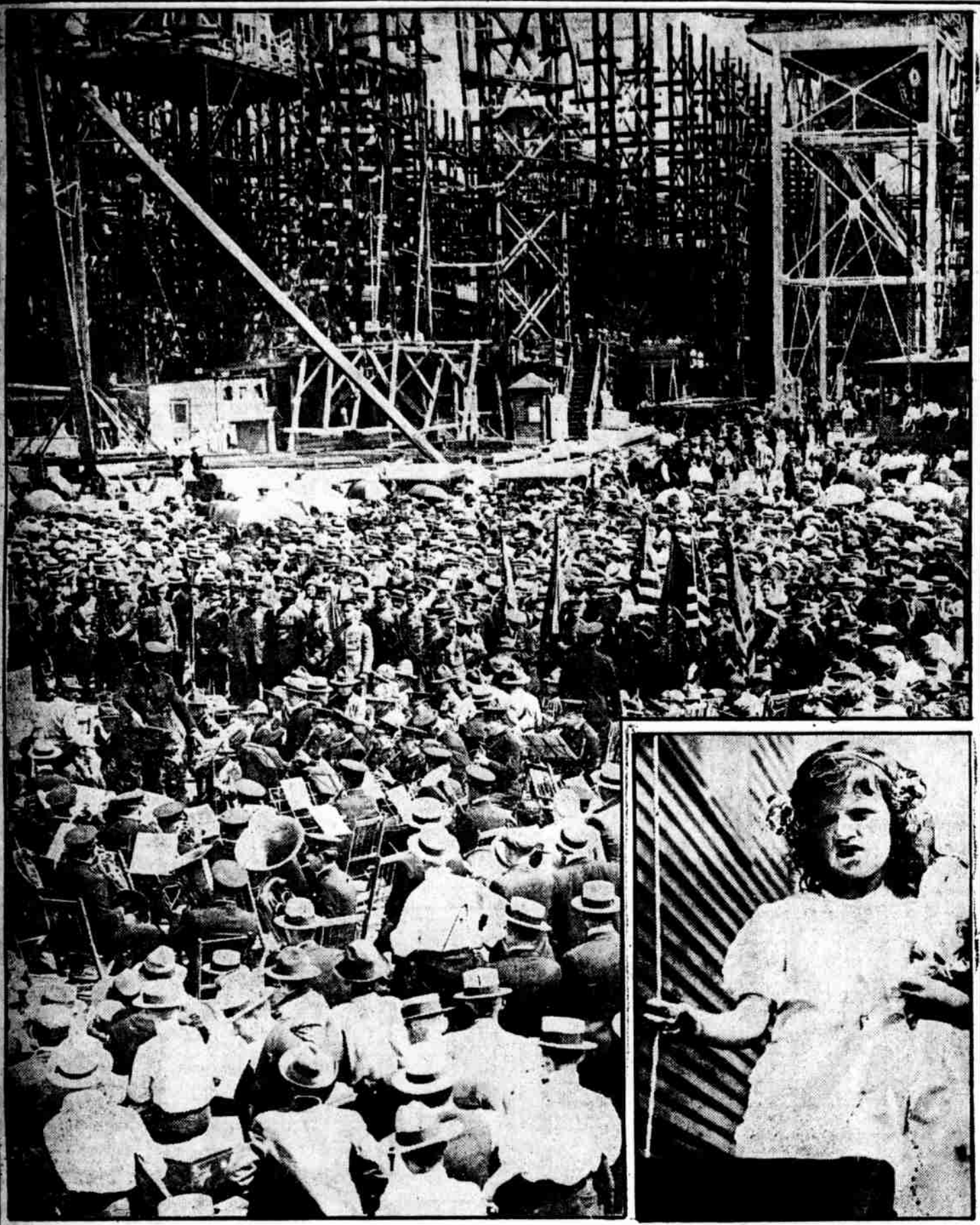


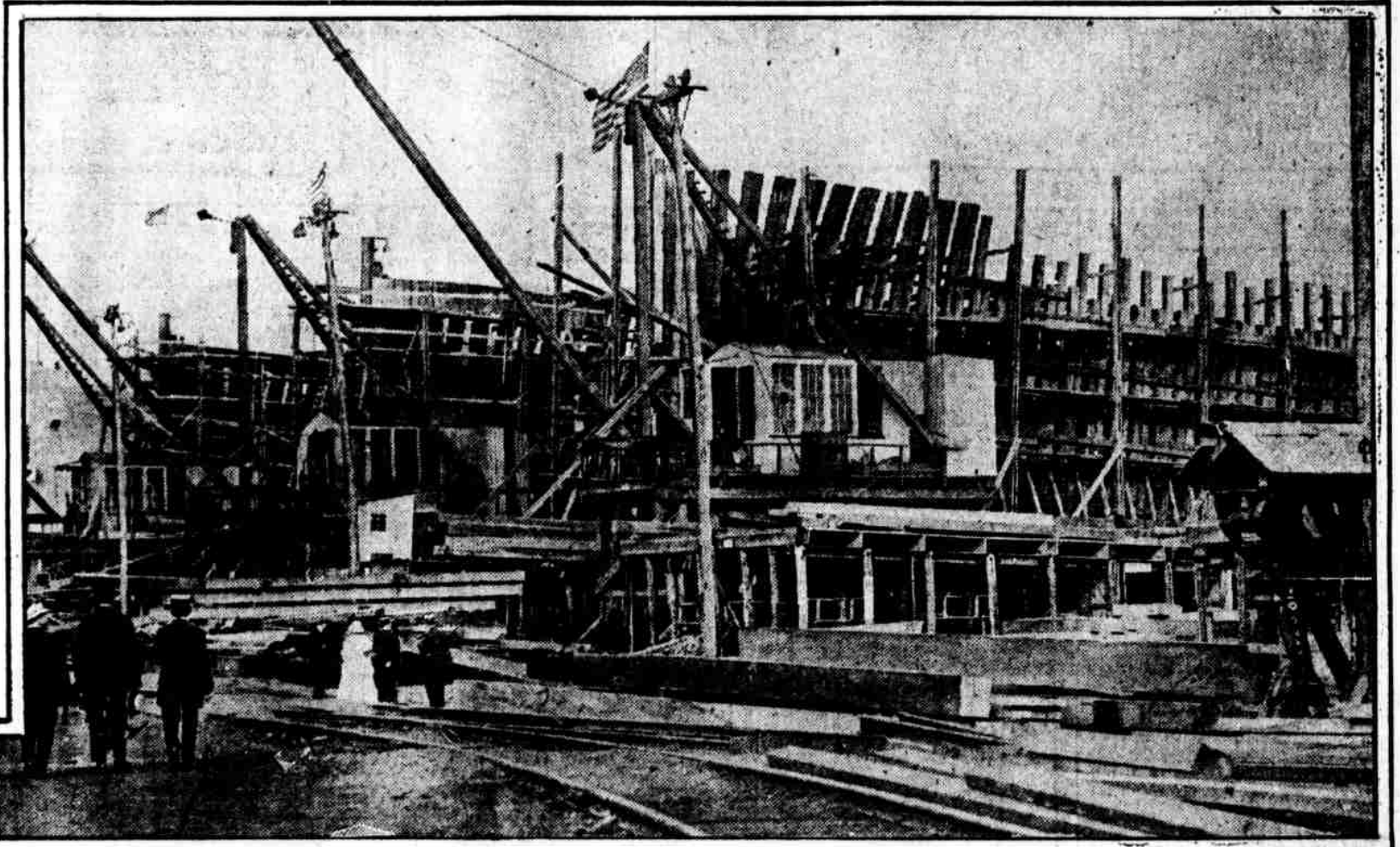

LATEST HAPPENINGS AT THE DELAWARE SHIPYARDS GRAPHICALLY PORTRAYED BY PHOTOGRAPHS
