Emergency Nurseries to Remain After War The Emergency Day Nursery isn't going to be an emergency nursery at all. This is what Mrs. Arthur M. Dodge, president of the Na-tional Federation of Day Nurseries, says: "They were started originally in England,

I believe, to care for the children while the mothers were working in the factories. Such great numbers of children were sent to thes nurseries for care that they must be regarded as a war measure. Such numbe handled in times of peace.

"But the fact is becoming evident that many of those women are going to have to keep to the work after the war has stopped. Men will come back, thousands of them, per-haps, absolutely out of commission. Indus-tries will have to be kept up and women will have to go on at the tasks that the war has brought them.
