# **Religion at Vine Street Institu**tion Is Contagious, Says **Its Superintendent**

RELIGION at Galilee Mission is con-tagious. That is how the Rev. J. J. D. Hall, who has been its superintendent almost ten years, explains the remarkable record he has made Within nine years Mr. Hall has placed thirty-three men in the ministry. Most of these obtained their start in the mis-

sion. Some are in divinity schools; eighteen or twenty have been ordained. For results his work in this line is said to stand alone in this part of the world For twenty years Galilee Mission, an Episcopal institution, has been a house of hope, on Vine street, for the poor and forsaken, who have entered its doors.



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
