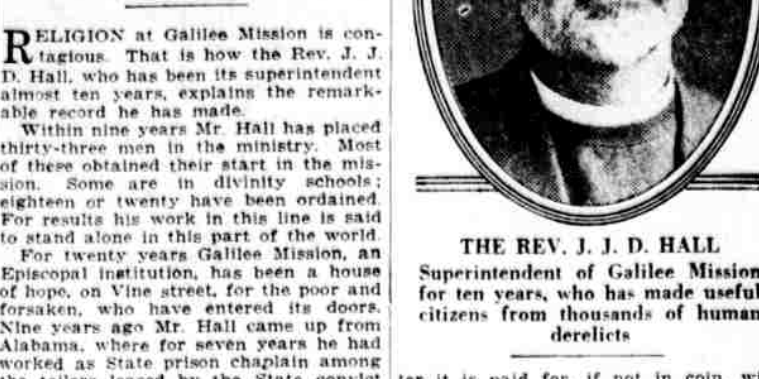
At least 100 Pennsylvanians, including two from City, Among Names FALL IN BATTLE

Washington, June 11.—One hundred and thirty casualties from the American expeditionary forces were announced by the War Department today, divided as follows: Twenty-five killed in action, three died of wounds, seven from disease, three from accident and other causes, 48 wounded severely and 43 wounded, details undetermined.

HUMAN DERELICTS REMADE INTO CHRISTIAN WORKERS

Galilee Mission Sends Thirty-three Into Ministry in Nine Years Religion at Vine Street Institution Is Contagious, Says Its Superintendent



RELIGION at Galilee Mission is contagious. That is how the Rev. J. J. D. Hall, who has been its superintendent almost ten years, explains the remarkable record he has made.

Within nine years Mr. Hall has placed thirty-three men into the ministry. Most of these obtained their start in the mission. Some are in divinity schools; eighteen or twenty have been ordained for regular work in the line in which they stand alone in this part of the world.

For twenty years Galilee Mission, an Episcopal institution, has been a house of hope for the poor and the homeless, for those who have been cast out of their homes by the State convict department to mines and turpentine camps. He had been close to human nature in the work in which he was engaged.

Mr. Hall, gray-bearded, tall and spare, is a beaming figure. The frailties of humanity never discourage him, for he has an inexhaustible belief in the innate goodness of mankind. Out of many an apparently hopeless case, he has made a man.

When this man entered my presence, reeling with drink, dirty and disheveled, he was a formidable object. He weighed 180 pounds, and his eyes were angry, bitter and blasphemous. He began reading the riot act to me and against all religions and all creeds. He refused to listen to me, and I talked to him as long as I could.

But that night he came back and gave himself to God. This man was a graduate of Tulane University and had been a successful business man. He had been in the employ of a large firm in New York city, but his probation officer for the town, buries all the poor, doctors many of the sick and led a decent, upright life.
