ALLEGED STALE MEAT SOLD TO GOVERNMENT

Was Sent to Pelham Bay Station and Belgian Relief Ship

New York, June 19.—That meat which T. George Lee, district superintendent of Armour & Co. in Philadelphia, characterized as "bad conditioned beef," and which Frederick L. Meagher, manager of the Armour North Delaware avenue plant in Philadelphia, described as stale, in consequence of which he "wiped it off with a damp rag with vinegar, water and salt," was sold to Wilson & Co., who in turn sold it under Government contract to the United States for use at the Pelham Bay naval training station...

Demanded Hearing The following statement was authorized last night by Wilson & Co.: "This investigation of the charges made against us by the Federal Trade Commission is in response to our own demand for an immediate hearing."

It also developed that bad meat from the same source also went to the troop ship Ceramic to the Belgian relief ship Samland, and to retail butchers in New York.

The particular consignment of meat which the Government alleges was in bad condition when sold was shipped by Armour & Co. from Sioux City to Philadelphia in a week in February, of which their Philadelphia superintendent writes: "This has been a very unsatisfactory week because of the great quantity of bad conditioned beef of our beef unloaded this week was very stale."

Mr. Meagher denied yesterday upon the witness stand that he had used soda in wiping off the meat, though admitting the use of vinegar, water and salt. He characterized the beef sold to Wilson & Co. as "all good, eatable meat."

When asked by Mr. Marshall if it was an unusual thing to have to wipe moisture off meat, he replied, "No, sir."

UNITED STATES DRAFTED TROOPS FIGHT AGAINST FOE LIKE VETERANS

Continued from Page One Twenty-eighth Infantry Division. This order, dated June 6, said: "The attack of the 'Conia' group against the heights of the Paris road will be postponed."

Those heights were held by American soldiers, and the reason the attack was postponed was that our artillery fire on June 2, 4 and 5 had so cut up the German division that it could not make the attack which had been ordered for the morning of June 7.

The assurance of the boche commanders was well illustrated by this order, which says in one place: "All officers and noncommissioned officers, as well as a certain number of men from each company, must be sufficiently well acquainted with English and French rapid-firing guns to enable them to use a great number of captured rifles of the enemy."

Americans Used German Guns This is a good place to mention again that when the Americans took the Bois de Belleau last week they were able to turn the German machine guns against the fleeing boche, although they had never been trained in the use of them.

Henceforth the American people may expect to hear of their soldiers fighting along the western front wherever the German drives his hardest. America's war plans are just now entering into their final stages, and it is not unlikely that a scale far ahead of that planned for us six months ago.

Every day now adds to our strength here in France, and that strength is every day, in the general view here, will win the war. Looking at the situation as it exists in France today, the American people may think their state that their entrance into the war was not delayed for even a month. It is no exaggeration to say that had we been a month later the German might now be in the environs of Paris.

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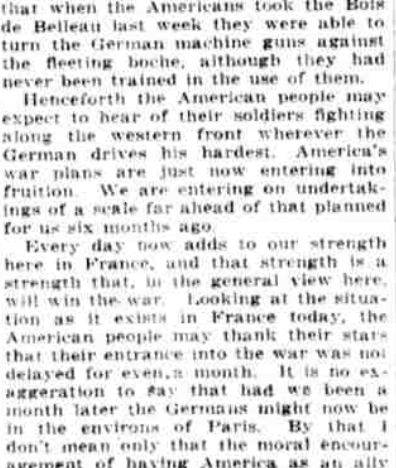

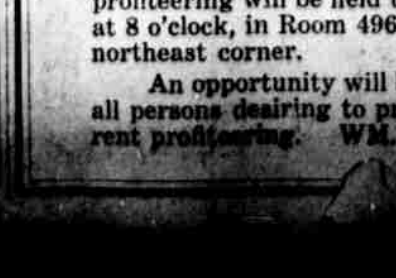
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
