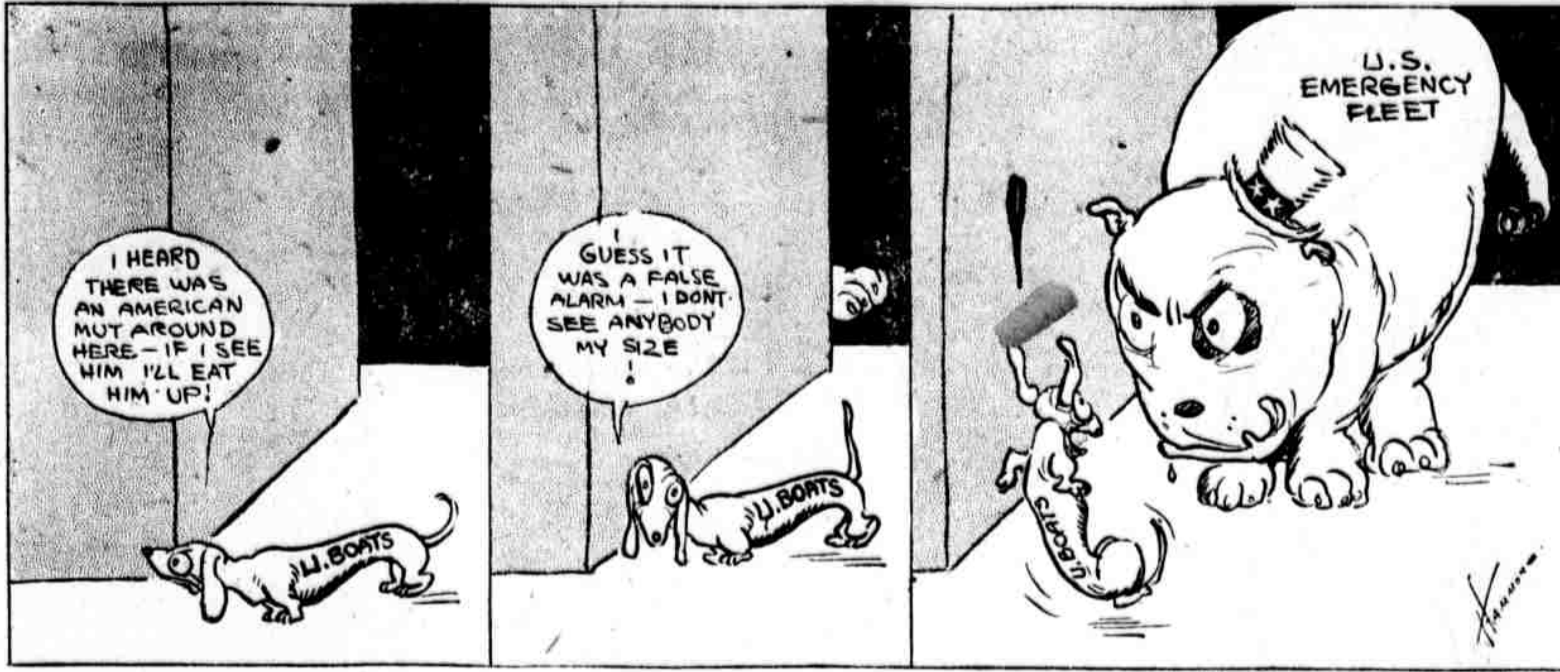

HOG ISLAND PROBE GOES ON IN SECRET

Officials of American International Called—Stone Defends Cost

Resuming the hearing of reports of Department of Justice agents who investigated alleged extravagances in Hog Island expenditures, United States Attorney Todd, assistant to Attorney General Gregory, today called more officials of the American International Shipbuilding Corporation to get their story of the operations resulting in the erection of the yard.

The hearings are being held in United States Attorney Kane's office in the Federal Building. The sessions are secret and no statements are being made as to the evidence submitted by the Department of Justice. The probe was ordered by President Wilson.
