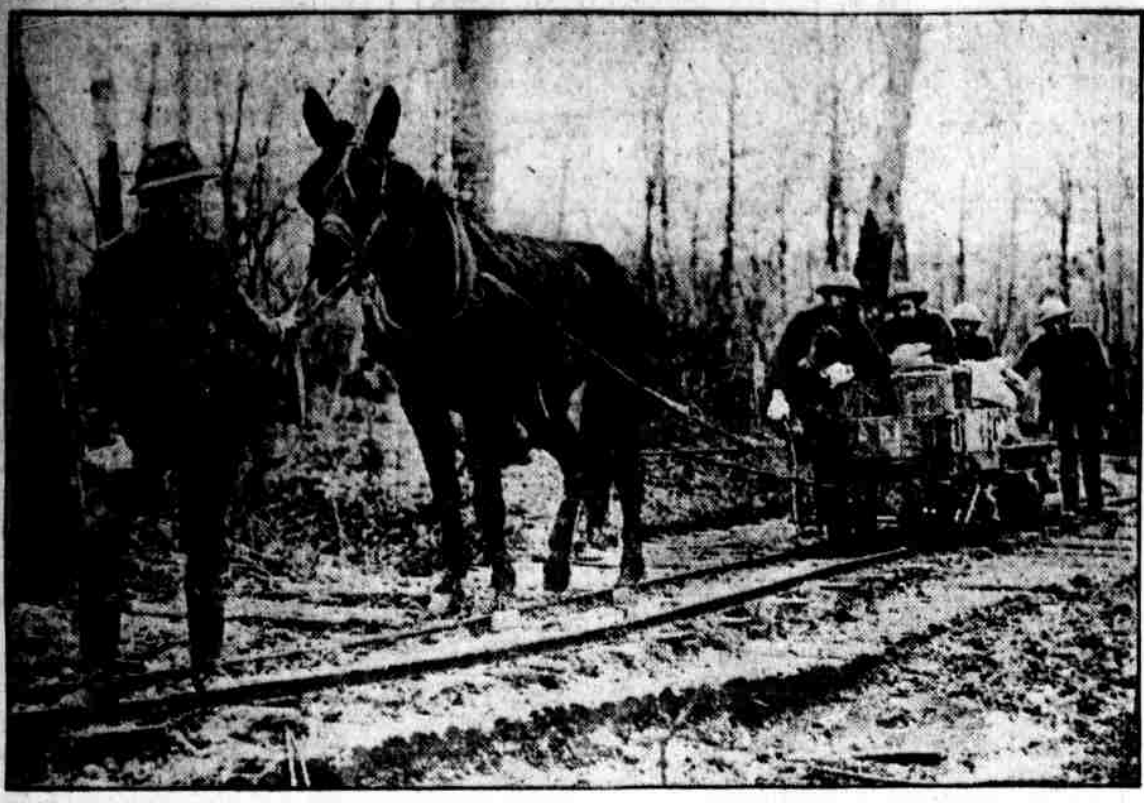

## THE DAY'S NEWS CENTERS ABOUT MEN AND WOMEN DEVOTED TO THE PROSECUTION OF THE WAR



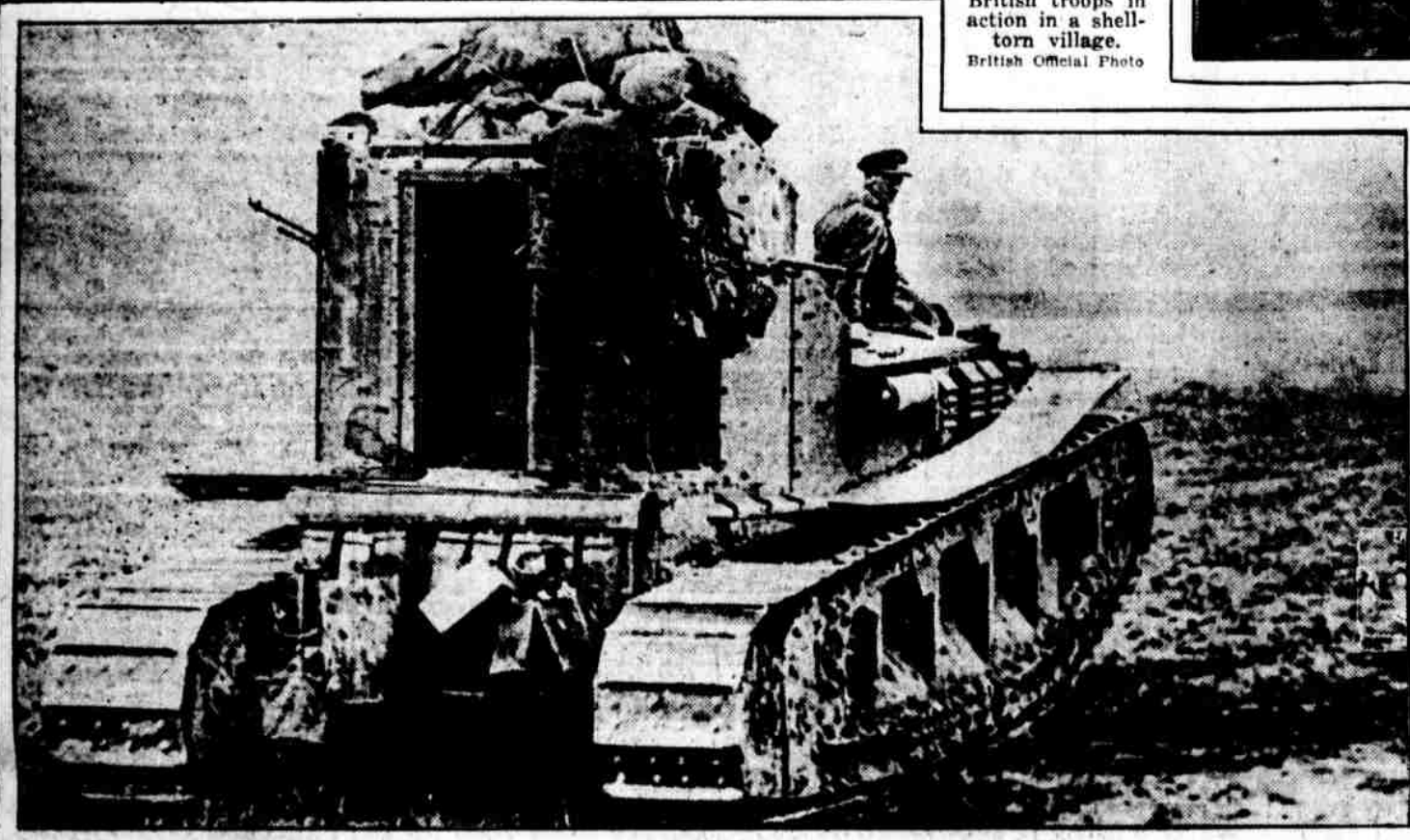

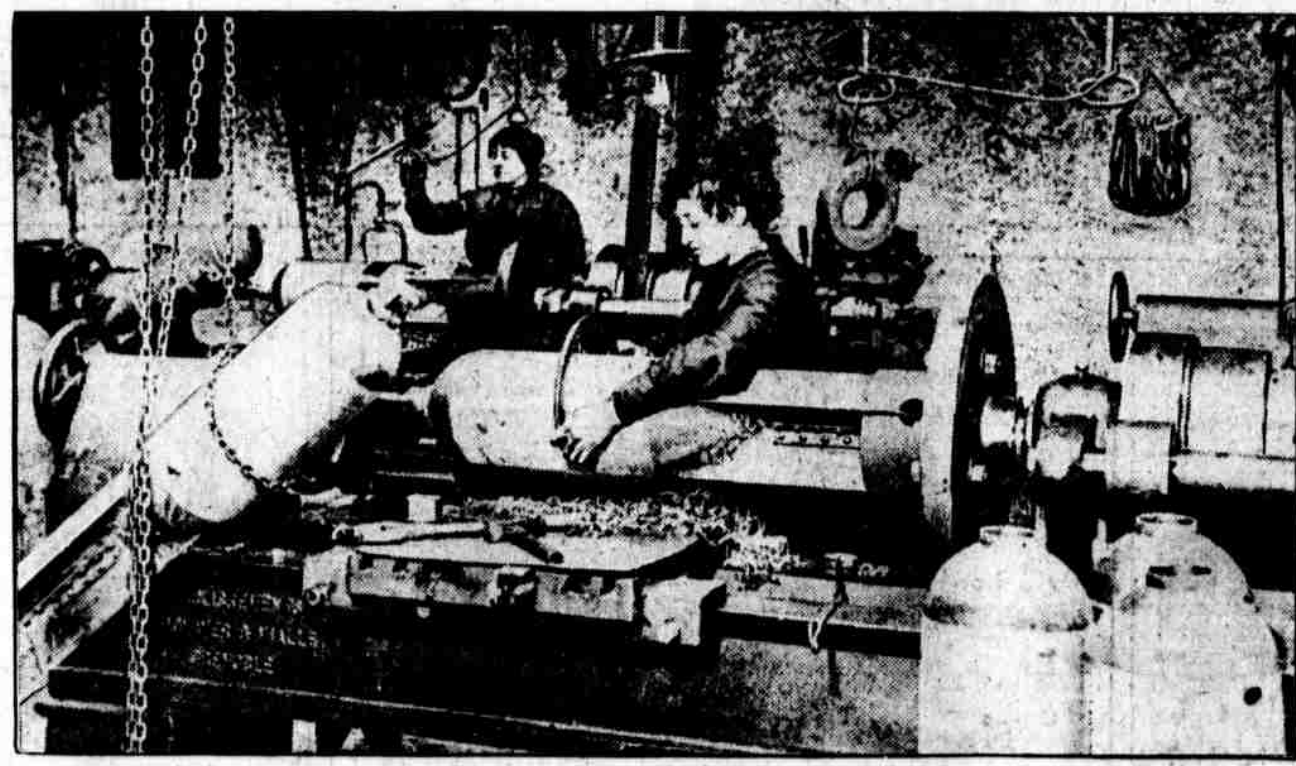
THERE ARE MODES IN TANKS just as with anything else, and the very latest thing in British tankdom is this smaller type machine, with the advantage of speed over the older style.
