ENDS LIFE ON DAY SET TO GO TO CAMP

Selective Puts Bullet in Head Few Hours Before Time for Train to Leave

Within a few hours of the time he was to leave for Camp Greenleaf, Georgia, Charles Holden, a selective, shot and killed himself this morning in his home, 2008 North Mascher street. Efforts to save his life in St. Mary's Hospital proved futile.

Holden was twenty-four years old and leaves a wife and a year-old baby. He was called to service and was scheduled to leave this morning for Camp Greenleaf, Ga., with a contingent of eighty-five other selected men from local hotels, No. 42, Fourth and York streets.

Mrs. Holden was preparing her husband's breakfast before he left for the draft board headquarters when she heard a shot on the second floor. She hurried upstairs and found her husband stretched across his bed with blood streaming from a wound in his head. His right hand clutched a revolver.

Draft board officials and neighbors of Holden said that he was never known to make any unparliamentary utterances and had not expressed any antagonism to the draft. An American flag was flying from a second-floor front window of the Holden home when Holden shot himself.

PHILADELPHIA SENDS 325 MORE TO CAMP

Selected Men From Nine Districts Entrain Amid Popular Demonstrations

Three hundred and twenty-five men from nine Philadelphia districts, comprising the fourth contingent in the movement which began June 24, entrained at the North Philadelphia station.

They were joined at the West Philadelphia station by sixteen men from West Chester, thirty-one from Media, forty-two from Lansdowne and twenty-seven from Lancaster.

With the departure of other contingents from this and other cities tomorrow eastern Pennsylvania will have contributed 3003 white selectives to the National Army under the most recent call of the provost marshal general.

The principal demonstration in connection with the departure of the drafted men today was a parade in Germantown of seventy-seven men from three Germantown draft districts, with an escort of mounted police, draft board officials in automobiles and a band of thirty pieces. Friends and relatives of the selected men cheered them from the sidewalks.

WARRINGTON DIRECTS ROAD

Former Philadelphia Division Head Goes to Washington

J. B. Warrington, former superintendent of the Philadelphia division of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway Company has been appointed Federal director of the Washington Terminal Railroad, Washington, D. C. This position includes supervision of all traffic through the Union station and the handling of all freight through the Potomac yard. The Potomac yard is the main freight gateway between the North and the South, through which freight in tremendous proportions is moving.

Warrington is fifty-two years old and has been superintendent of the Philadelphia division of the Reading since 1902.

HELD IN ATTACK CASE

Negro Alleged to Be One of Gang Which Annoys Couples

William S. Nicholas, negro, thirty-first street and Passunk avenue, was held for further investigation by Magistrate Stevenson today in the case of an alleged attack made upon Louis Huberman, 632 Reed street, in Fairmount Park, Tuesday night.

Huberman, with a girl companion, was sitting on a bench at the Lemon Hill station when the negro approached. The girl screamed, and he fled. Early today he was arrested by a special detail of park guards sent out to round up men who are alleged to prey upon young couples in the park. Nicholas is a member of this gang, according to the police.

J., detective force, sustaining a fracture of the hand last night when he attempted to arrest a burglar, twenty-three years old, 1011 Locust street, Camden, on a charge of burglary. 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WILL RESUME SUMMER SCHEDULE TO SHORE

Atlantic City Service Not Cut. Pocono Region Also Unaltered

Resumption of the summer schedule to Atlantic City on Sunday, and to other South Jersey seashore resorts and the Pocono Mountains Saturday, was announced today by the Pennsylvania Railroad.

No cut will be made in the Atlantic City train service below that of last year. This announcement is expected to bring joy to thousands of city folks who are in the habit of spending the week-end at the shore hotels.

All trains to Atlantic City, the railroad officials announce, will be operated at the same rate last summer. Summer service to Cape May and other South Jersey shore points will be resumed Saturday afternoon with the 4:07 o'clock train, which will run to Cape May, Ocean City and Wildwood.

Summer service to the Pocono Mountains will be resumed Saturday afternoon with the 12:48 Pocono express. A local, which will connect the Jersey Shore Station at 1:15 o'clock in the afternoon, will make all stops between Trenton and Tobscohan.

The train which left Broad Street Station at 3:08 o'clock in the afternoon last summer for North Jersey shore points will be eliminated. Instead a train will leave for 4:07 o'clock for the Girl, Long Branch and other points on the north coast.

The train operated to Seaside Park last year which left Broad Street Station at 1:28 o'clock also will be discontinued. Instead the Pennsylvania will run a special train every Saturday to Seaside Park, leaving Broad Street Station at 1:48 o'clock.

CUT RATES TO RESORTS SOON

Schedules Will Not Be as Low as Formerly, However

Reduced fares for excursions to seashore, mountain and other summer resorts are expected to be established within a week by the railroad administration, according to a dispatch today from Washington.

The rates will not be as low as those obtaining prior to June 10, when the administration advanced the regular passenger rate to three cents a mile and canceled excursion rates. They are expected to be between 10 and 20 per cent below the three-cent-a-mile rate.

The passenger traffic committees of the railroad administration are preparing the reduced excursion schedules for submission to Director General of Railroads McAdoo, who, in all probability, will approve them substantially as proposed.

SAY TOOK BRIBE

Two Men Charge He Released Them After Traffic Violations

George Clark, a reserve policeman, was arraigned before the Police Trial Board today on a charge of bribery in connection with the release of two men who had produced papers showing he had been arrested for violation of the traffic rules.

John R. Saville, head of the Pinkerton Detective Agency in this district for the last thirty-four years, died on Tuesday at his home, 1342 North Alden street. The funeral services will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the American Union, 1342 North Alden street, and is supervised by three sons.

In his career as a detective Mr. Saville tracked down some of the most notorious criminals in America, Africa and Europe. He was noted as a shrewd detective of forgers and embezzlers. His early apprenticeship was served under the late Captain Robert T. Linden, who later was this city's superintendent of police.

Mr. Saville is credited with the capture of Major Phillips, who was charged with having defrauded the city of funds while superintendent of the Philadelphia Almshouse.

"NOISELESS CONVENTION" HERE WHEN DEAF SOCIETY MEETS

Deliberations at Sessions Next Week Will Be Conducted in Finger Language—Delegates From All Sections of Country

PHILADELPHIA next week will witness a "noiseless convention," beginning Monday.

With just as much business to transact as any convention that has been here, the National Fraternal Society of the Deaf will conduct deliberations in the Adelphi Hotel with 100 per cent less noise and sounding conversation.

When a delegate has a message for the meeting, he rises and lets his hands do the talking. The chair acknowledges the speaker's right to the floor in the same manner. Officers submit reports in the "tongue" of the finger-made alphabet.

About 500 delegates are expected at this annual meeting, which is being prepared by the Philadelphia division of the national body. The convention sessions will contain men from virtually every State in the country. Many are planning to bring their families. Several sightseeing tours of the city have been planned, and the Wanamaker store has issued an invitation to the convention to make the store one of its points of visitation.

A excursion to Atlantic City was arranged by the local committee as an event for the last day of the convention, but because of unsettled transportation conditions and the difficulty of getting special cars the trip has been canceled.

Wednesday night, the annual banquet and convention will be held in the Adelphi.
