CONDEMN PRO-GERMAN IRISH

United League Denounces the "Apostles of Brutality": By the Associated Press New York, July 3.—Resolutions condemning "those Irishmen and Irish-Americans who have shown themselves to be apostles of the German gospel of barbarism and brutality, but who do not represent the Irish race here or abroad," were adopted at a meeting here last night of the United Irish League. The resolutions also called on "our Irish and kin across the ocean to rally to the support of every movement having for its object the defeat of Germany by our beloved country and our allies." Speakers branded as traitors to the United States any Irish-American who by his actions, "would compel the return of even a single British soldier from the western front to stand guard in Ireland."
