marine. Oldfield is the oldest man in the coun-try still actively engaged in automobile racing. He has been in the business virtually ever since it became a sport, and has made a record which is the envy of all his rivals. He has seen seven-teen consecutive years of the automobile racing game and has had all sorts of peculiar and hair-raising experiences.




