Washington, July 10 .- National pro-

Washington, July 10.—National pro-hibition as a war measure, under provi-sions of the Norris amendment to the \$11,000,000 emergency agricultural ap-propriation bill, remained before the Sen-ate for consideration today, but with the probability, however, that the measure would not be taken up until after dis-posal of the resolution authorizing Gov-ernment control of the electric communi-cation systems. The amendment was not reached yes-terday as expected, consideration of un-contested amendments to the appropria-tion bill having taken up most of the session. Senator Penrose, of Pennsylva-nia, raised a point of order, which is ex-pected to be pressed when the prohibi-tion amendment is called up for consid-eration and a vote. The Pennsylvania Senator contended the Norris amend-ment violates the Senate rules in that it is general legislation and thus cannot be attached as a "rider" to an appropriation bill.


