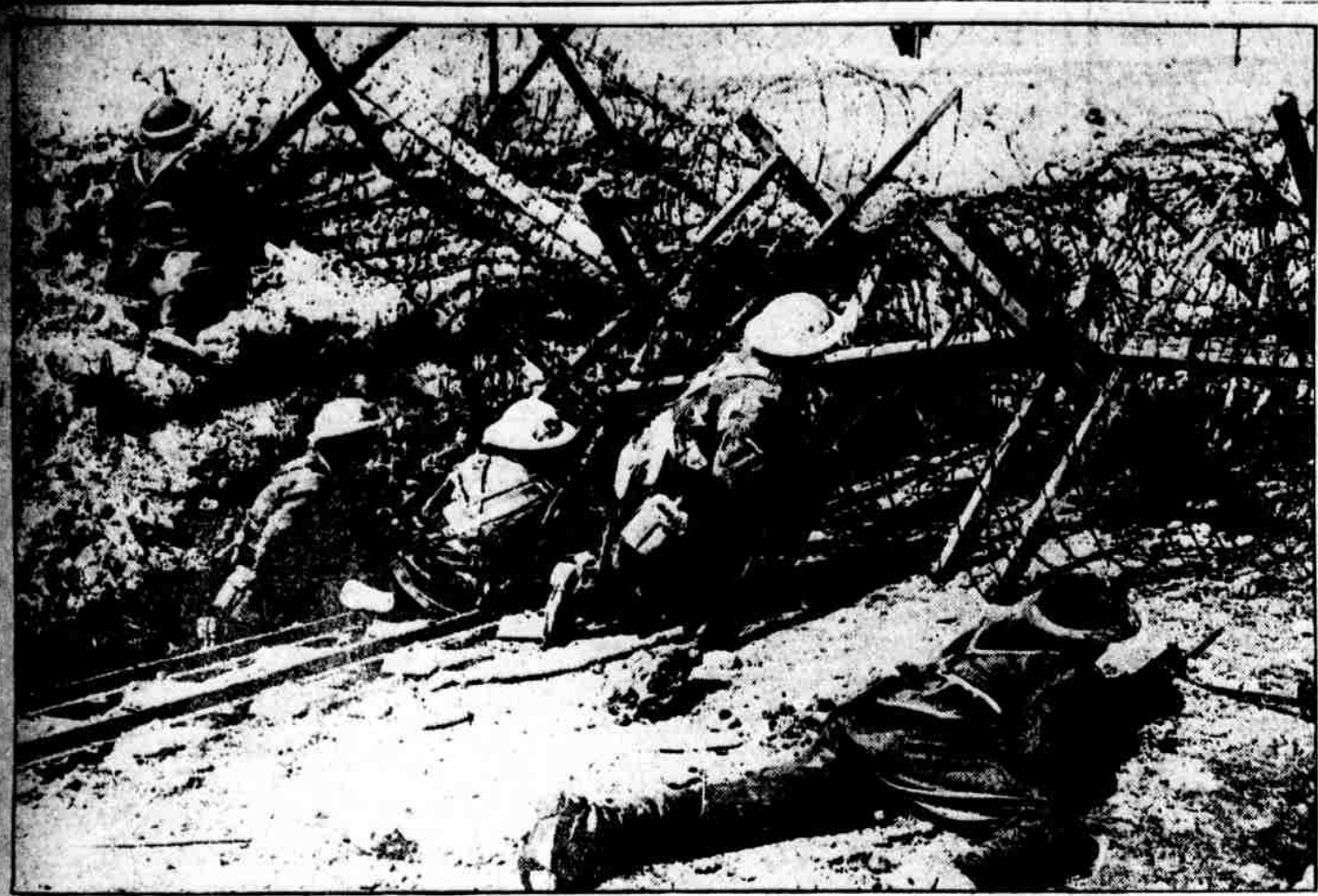

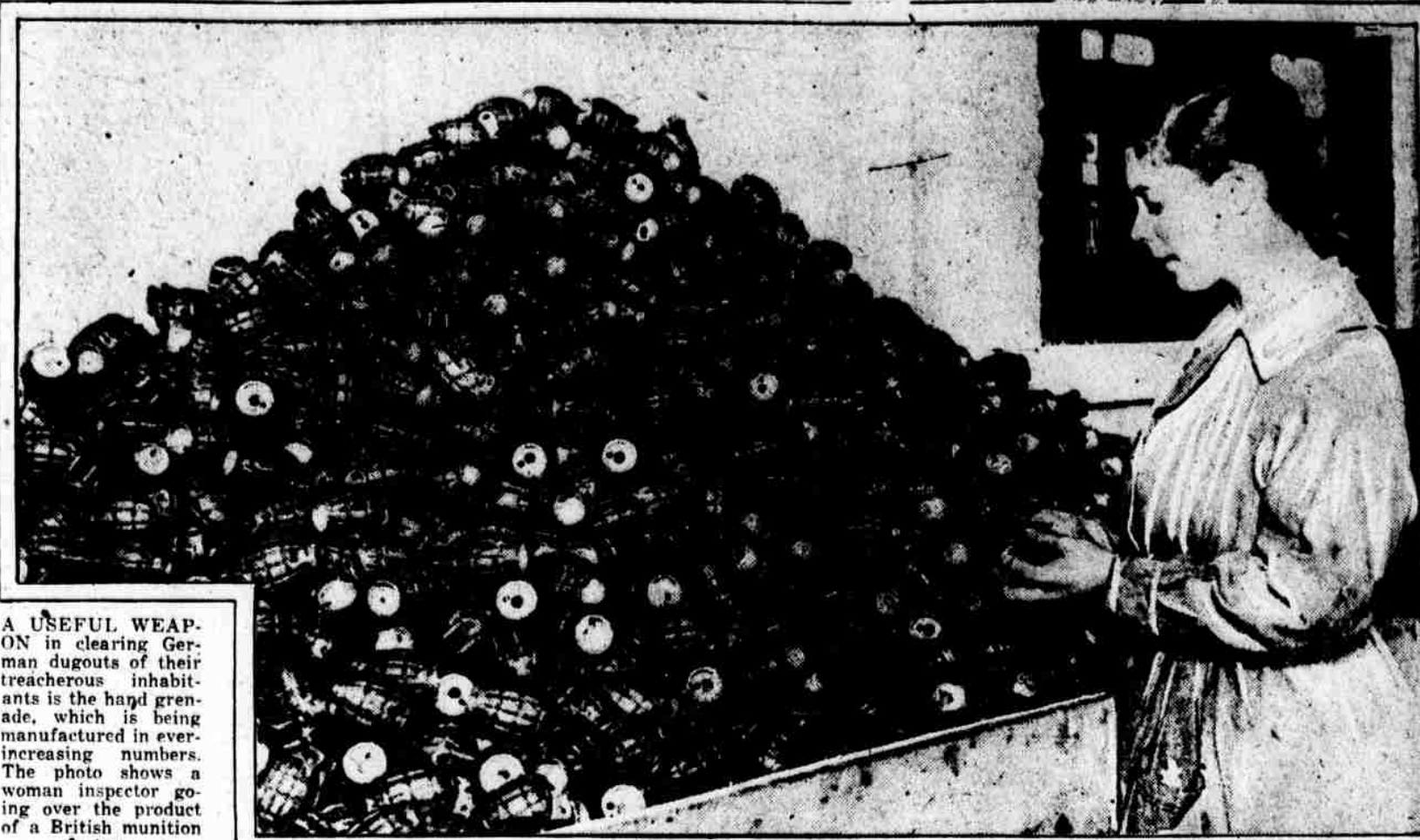

RESUME OF THE DAY'S NEWS HAPPENINGS FINDS THE WAR HOLDING THE CENTER OF INTEREST



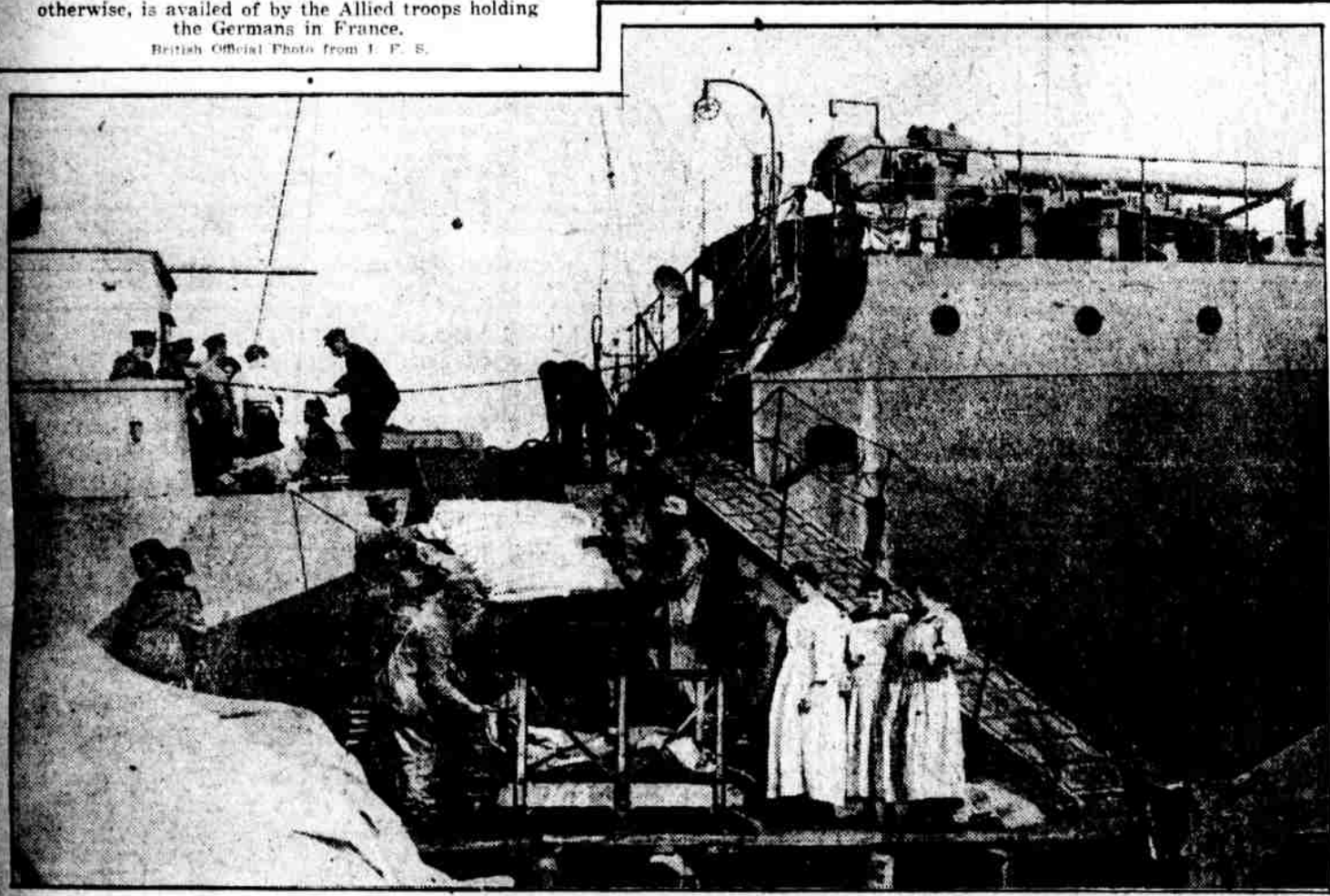
EVERY CONCEIVABLE OBSTACLE, natural and otherwise, is availed of by the Allied troops holding the Germans in France.
