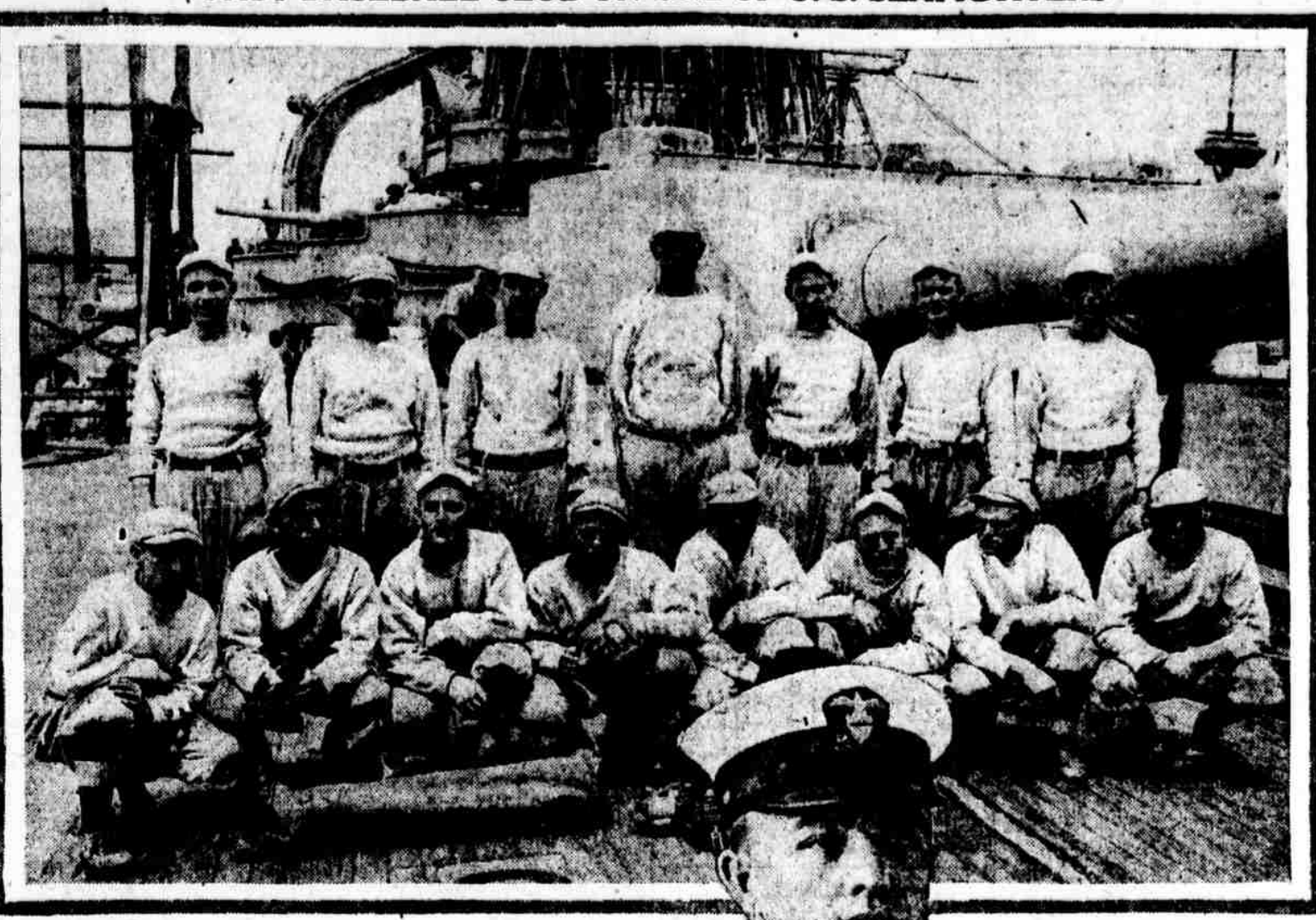
SCRAPS ABOUT SCRAPPERS

PHILS WINNERS IN THIRTEENTH

Cravath Sole Scorer in Sizzling Extra-Inning Contest

JACOBS BLANKS PIRATES

Pittsburgh, Pa., July 19.—The Phillies are so used to playing extra innings of late that yesterday they went after the Pirates and played them off their feet in thirteen sessions, winning by a score of 1 to 0.

Cravath pitched the best ball of his career, and although a little wild at times was generally invincible when men were on base.

It was left to Gavy Cravath to end the game in the thirteenth inning, when he pitched a perfect inning, and on a sacrifice by Pearce and came tearing down the base path as the signal for the squeeze play was given, and Burns bunted to the pitcher, who fumbled and allowed Burns to reach first. He had no chance to reach at the plate, and the run was earned, ending one of the greatest games ever seen at Forbes Field.

JACOBS started off rather wild and had the Pirates played the game right in the first inning. He went minus Harry Heilmann and with Ty Cobb suffering from an injured shoulder. Heilmann bade his mates goodnight after the second game with the Yanks and returned to San Pedro, Cal., where he will enlist in the navy.

Heilmann hails from that part of the country and at San Pedro will join a baseball team of almost major league caliber. San Pedro is a submarine base and among its enlisted men includes Billy Shaffer, who played with the Yanks as well as other former big show performers. Heilmann expected an early call into the draft army and close the navy in preference. His loss will be a big blow to the Tigers, for he quit with a batting average of .325.

With Heilmann gone and Cobb hurt, the chances of the Tigers giving the Red Sox a hard time are not so bright as they were when he was here.

Baker broke up the second game of the double-header at Philadelphia, and only when he hit into the right fielder in the sixth round, sending the fight across.

To add to Manager Miller's other troubles while the Yankees were in Philadelphia, one of the shipyard men at Sparrows Point has left the team and has a shipbuilding plant at Sparrows Point.
