They have attacked over a front of more than three miles on each side of the village of Nesles, the apex of the greatest advance was toward the east where the Americans pushed on some distance from the town of Sergy and approached Chamery. Although the anneunced purpose of

the attack was the straightening out of the line between Seringes and Cierges, this is really secondary to the outflanking of the Germans to the outhward. The enemy is holding very strong positions at Roncheres and St. Gemme, where his line is still less than five miles from the Marne and a continued advance between esles and Clerges would force him o fall back to escape being cut off

rom the rear. This seems to be the only sector where the Allies are attacking with their infantry. Reports from the front tell of heavy artillery fire along the most of the line between Sols-sons and Rheims., The Germans attacked the Allied


