

CASUALTY TOTAL 520; 222 PENNSYLVANIANS

Army List has 468 Names, With 303 Missing and Ninety Killed in Action—Marine Losses Fifty-two, With Four Slain

Washington, Aug. 9. Names of 303 officers and men missing in action were contained in five army lists, aggregating 468, made public today by the War Department. A Marine Corps casualty list brought the total to 520.

Nearly one-half of the army men named were from Pennsylvania. There were 222 from that State, with seventy-four from Philadelphia alone. Others were from South Carolina, New York, Somerset, Berlin, Pittsburgh and other Pennsylvania cities. There was nothing to indicate to what branch of the service they belonged.

The number of missing in action was the largest announced in any single day since the casualties from the fighting on the Marne-Aisne front began arriving last Monday. There were four officers—a captain and three lieutenants—and a large number of non-commissioned officers on the list.

SCANDINAVIANS URGE U. S. TO AID FINLAND

Pledge No Food Sent to Relieve Famine Will Reach Germans

Washington, Aug. 9. Identical notes from Norway, Sweden and Denmark appealing to the United States to aid famine sufferers in Finland have been presented to the State Department by the ministers of the three Scandinavian countries.

Pledges were offered that no food sent from America would be allowed to fall into the hands of the Germans or to aid Germany in any way. Absence of a responsible Government in Finland to give such guarantees on its own account until now has blocked all plans for help from American or Allied sources.

The appeal was the subject of a conference between Colville Barclay, counselor of the British embassy, who is acting as ambassador, and Acting Secretary Polk. A reply probably will be made shortly.

The Scandinavian Governments acted, it is learned, after being urged as brothers to do something for the Finns. The American Government is assured in the appeal that the Finns will be willing to accept whatever terms may be adopted by the Scandinavians regarding the administration of supplies and that Germany also will furnish proper guarantees.

Dr. Kaarlo Ignatius, who was sent to this country last fall by the Finnish Government for the dual purpose of seeking recognition of Finnish independence and obtaining of foodstuffs, has returned to Finland. He was unable to obtain any assurance that Finland would be recognized by the United States, although recognition has been given by Switzerland and France as well as the Scandinavian countries and Germany.

It is stated that political conditions in Finland are so unsettled as to make it seem unwise from the American and British standpoint to grant recognition.

Adopt Fire-Prevention Standards
