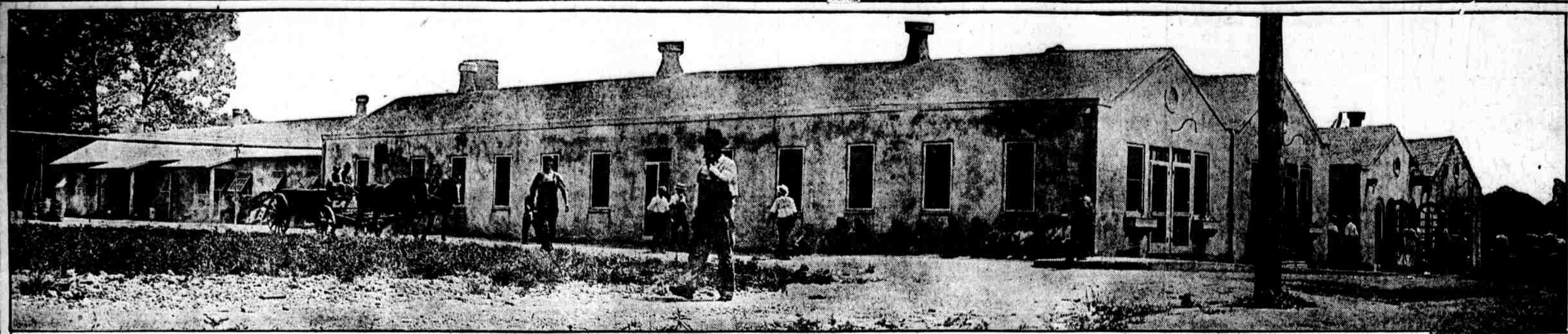

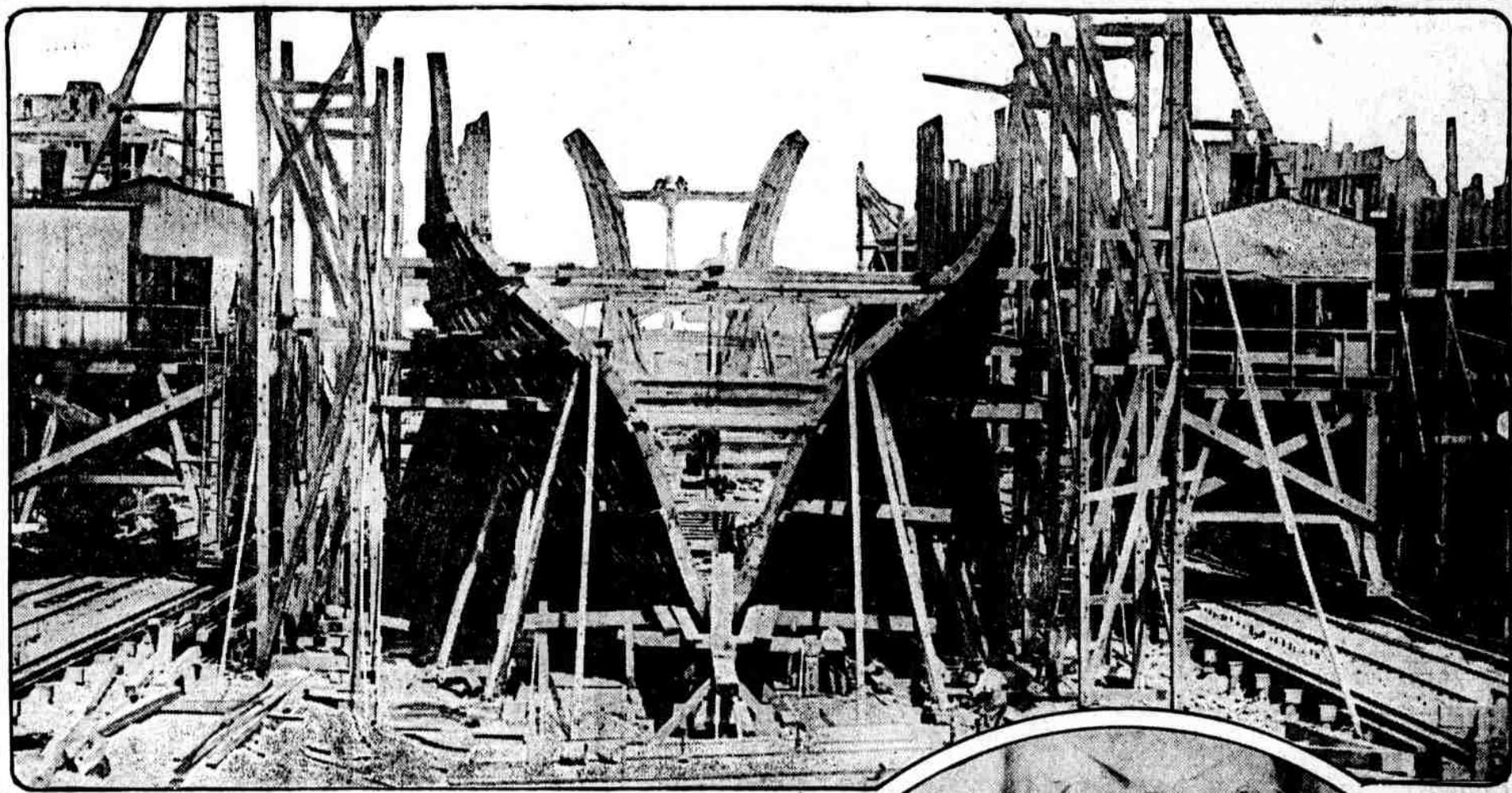
TRUE AMERICAN SPEED MARKS HOME AND SHIP BUILDING AT THE TRAYLOR YARD

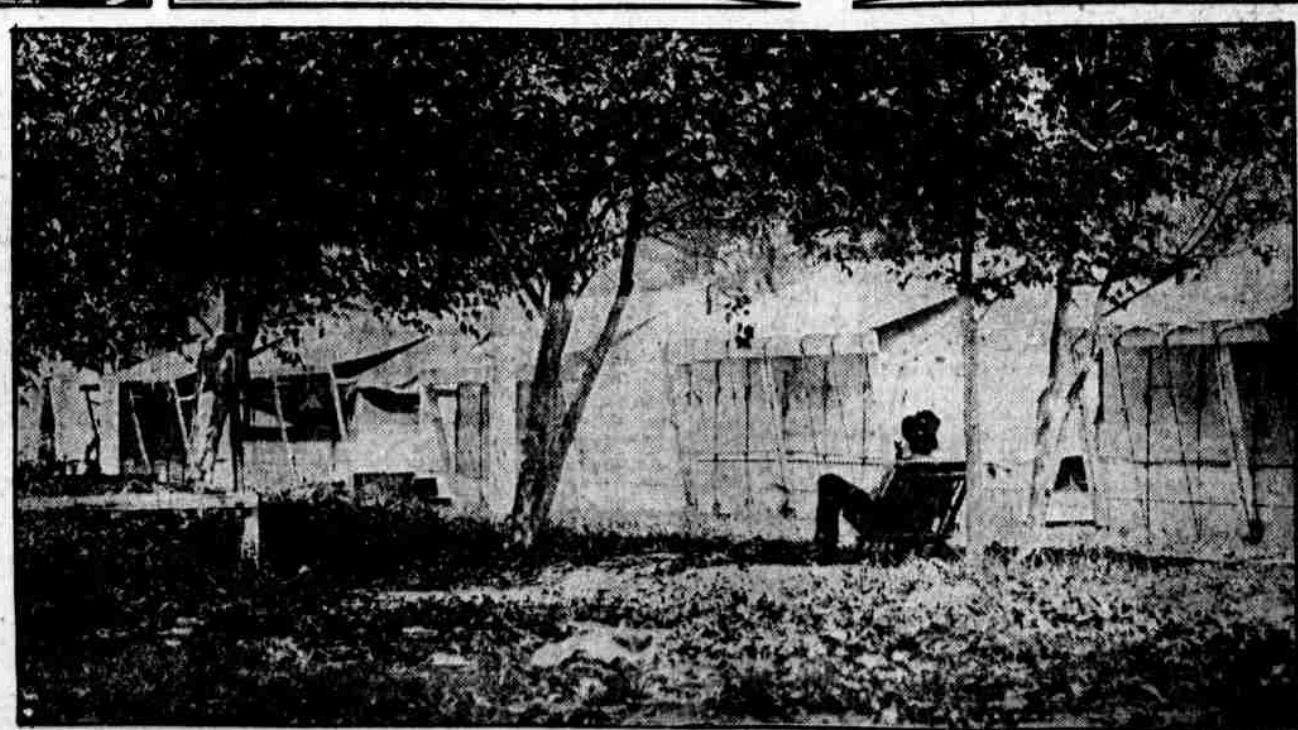
RAISING THE WOODEN WALLS OF A NEW FLEET that will redound to America's honor in peace as well as in war.
