"DRY ZONE" LINE

Some Expected to Seek Safety by Walking Measurement

AIR-LINE PLAN APPLIED

Wholesalers Must Close Doors. but May Sell Goods Outside of Circle

Some of the Frankford saloonkeepers orced out of business by the establishnent of the half-mile dry zones around the Frankford Arsenal, will base their fight against the order on the question whether measurement of the area is to be made "as the crow files," or on the walking distance from the arsenal.

This is the belief of Assistant United States District Attorney Sterrett. Some of the saloonkeepers affected by the order protest they are not within the half mile area, he said this afternoon.

According to Mr. Sterrett, the Government's survey was made "as the crow

flies," while private measurements made by the Retail Liquor Frealers' Associa-tion were over the walking distance from the arsenal. The airline measurement, Mr. Sterrett said, would be shorter than the measurement taken y the galoonkeepers.

Mr. Sterrett also announced that; contrary to expectations, the six whole-salers in the dry zone would have to cen their doors closed.

They will still be permitted to do business, however, according to Mr. Sterrett, by telephone and by solicitors, with their customers outside the dry zone. A delegation of wholesalers called on Mr. Sterrett today and inquired about the legality of brewers and distillers making deliveries to the wholesalers in the district, the law providing that no deliveries should be made within the

Mr. Sterrett informed the wholesalers that the section of the ruling would be waived and that deliveries would be per-

Fifteen saloons, in the "dry zone" closed at midnight Saturday.

This is the first day under the new and many men on their way to work found the customary places of re-freshment closed "by order of the Gov-ernment." Not a single "oasis" could found within the half-mile dry bel-

Government agents were in the dry district to see that the order was carried out. They were prepared to arrest violators of the ruling immediately.
