GERMANS CRACKING BRITISH BELIEVE: Continued from Page One. In the view of the village down, which rises again still rather higher to the old Schwaben redoubt, which commanded this blunt curve or angle of the Ancre from Miramont downward. From the direction of Miramont and its neighbors, Iles, Grandcourt and Beaucourt, came the sound of guns, heavily firing, which showed that Miramont still was strongly held by the enemy, though almost surrounded. The town itself is hidden by the curve of the river and the northern slopes of Thiepval, but Beaucourt was in sight, and the smoke and dust going up from the country beyond, varied with one great column of fiery smoke where

PRISONERS DROP ALL BUT BREAD: They were, of course, unarmed; they made no attempt to shoot me or any one else. If they were fortunate enough to be detected in their hiding places they surrendered at once, throwing down their rifles and flinging away their equipment, especially their heavy iron helmets, which now are usually camouflaged with patches of brown, yellow and green paint. They flung away everything

some dump of oil or explosives was alight, proved how resolute was the fighting on both sides. Coming down from Mesnil Wood an officer who accompanied me and I crossed the railway from Arras to Albert, and Amiens which road have runs along the western bank of the Ancre and further by Achiet-le-Grand. It has been the object of much hard fighting. It is, of course, broken to pieces, the lines torn up and bridges crushed down across in it in a permanent way, owing to the craters of heavy shells and gaps at streams; yet I believe that our industrious sappers could put it all straight in a fortnight, to put everything straight in the function of those evitable corps when they are not engaged upon blowing everything up.

Canadians Capture Monchy-le-Preux: Continued from Page One. Above Croiselles, it was five miles away and looked only like a long, dark mound surmounted by stalks of trees. Besides my whole interest was concentrated upon the situation in Croiselles, where the enemy was still holding out with machine guns on the spot and with artillery probably secured placed behind the main Hindenburg line, which is only about 2500 yards distant. However, the recapture of Monchy and the fact that the British are advancing upon Guenappe, a mile south of it, upon the Coteul, is the most important item of news from this front.

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except their clothes and a little sack, in which they generally carried black bread, bits of meat, soap and razor. They had thrown away their regulation cowhide knapsack long ago, as it is too heavy for fighting. As I understood their language, I could overhear them talking among themselves while they rested and waited for others to be brought in. They complained that they lost their companions through the fault of their sergeant major, but were heartily glad to be taken.

Over the top of the ridge which just concealed the village, machine-gun bullets were swooping in occasional showers, also at random from the village and from behind the Hindenburg line, the Germans were evidently endeavoring to check any new attacks upon Croiselles from this quarter. Indeed, they had already checked two, as I heard from men who had hastily dug trenches there—men showing the strain of danger and watching, and sick with mud and dirt and sleeplessness, all the more because rain fell hard at intervals, but quite confident of the success of the advance if the order for it should come.

DRAFT CARD SALE SUSPECTED: Police Believe Prisoner Registered Often and Sold to Slackers. The police believe they have discovered a draft registration repeater who sold his extra registration cards to slackers. The suspect is Nicholas Manacone, seventh street near Green, who was held in \$500 bail for court today by Magistrate Harris for the alleged larceny of a valuable organ. Manacone, it was testified, had left a registration card with the owner of the accordion as security. The card bore the name Michael Garbilana, 1108 Vine street. Manacone and the accordion disappeared. The instrument was recovered in a pawn shop and Manacone was arrested. When he was searched, another registration card, bearing the name of Manacone and issued by a Worcester, Mass., draft board was found. Detectives today went to Manacone's home to hunt more registration cards.

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
