CITED FOR HIS BRAVERY

Rallied Unit and Drove Back Germans-Mother Died **Proud of Boy**

Word has been received through un-ficial sources that Lieutenant Thomas 3. W. Fales, widely known cricketer ind a nephew of John Wanamaker, was severely wounded in the Franco-Ameri-Can drive on July 30. Lieutenant Fales, who is the son of

Lieutenant Fales, who is the son of the late Mrs. Mary W. Fales. 4407 Spruce street, was cited for valor on the battlefield during the defense of the Marne about the middle of July. The first news of his having been so honored came in a dispatch from Raymond Car-roll, special correspondent for the Fublic Ledger, who told in detail how Lieuten-ant Fales, after his company had been scattered by a force German charge. scattered by a flerce German charge, managed to rally his men, reform his lines, throw back the Germans and rejoin his regiment, bringing thirty-five prisoners along.

Report Unconfirmed

So far Lieutenant Fales's family has been unable to confirm the unofficial re-port that he had been wounded. The only word they have received came in a letter from a private in the lieutenant's company to the family of this enlisted man, in which he said that only nine-teen men of the company were unwounded and that Lieutenant Fales was

badly hurt. This news was conveyed to the Fales family on Sunday and since then they have vainly tried to obtain definite in-formation from official sources as to the fate of the lieutenant. Telegrams to the War Department have remained unan-swered, as have also cables to the Red ss and other war relief organizations in Paris. Lieutenant Fales is thirty-two years

In Paris. Lieutenant Fales is thirty-two years old and a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania. Before enlisting he was a member of the firm of Fales & Dutcher. In Eastern Siberia, fighting continues between the Bolsheviki and the Czecho-Slovaks, who have been reinforced by Towness






