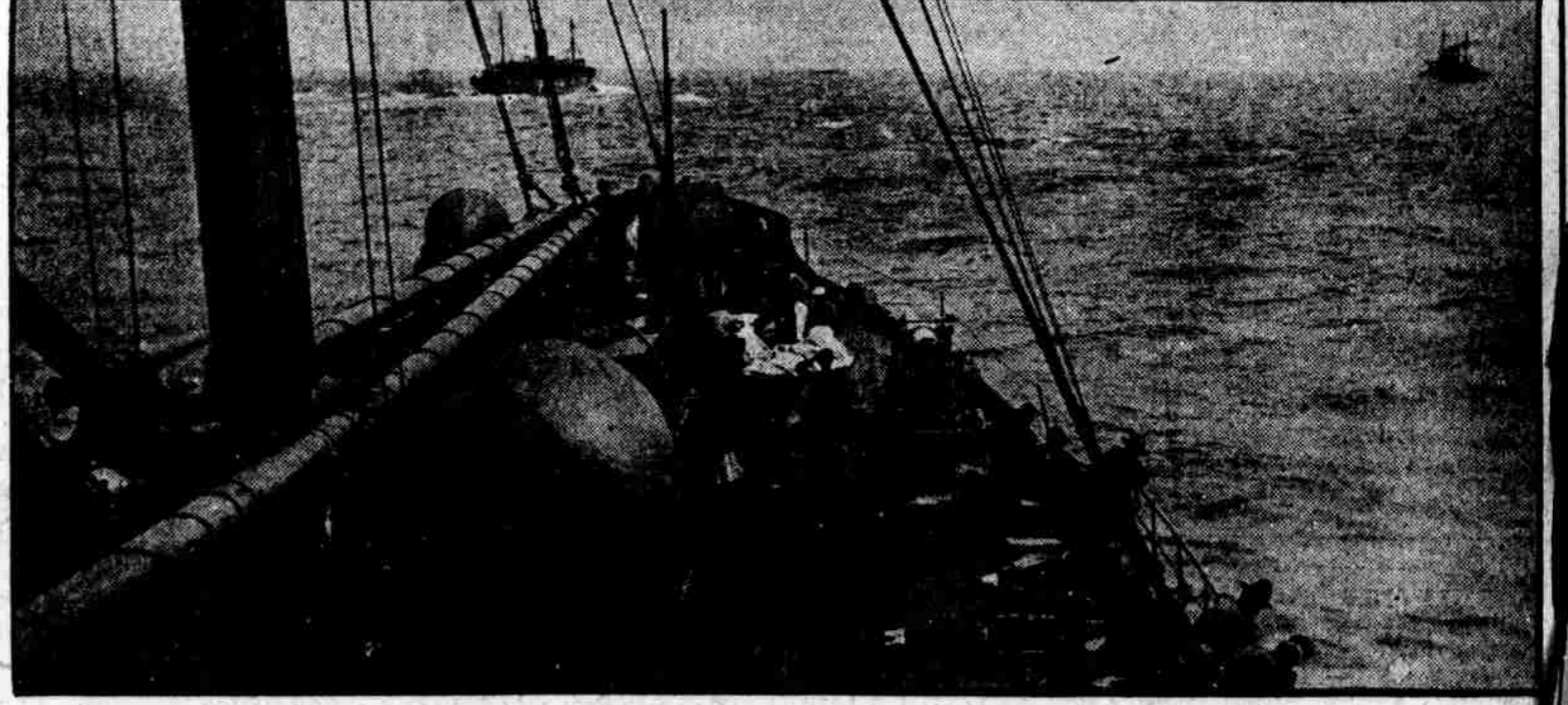
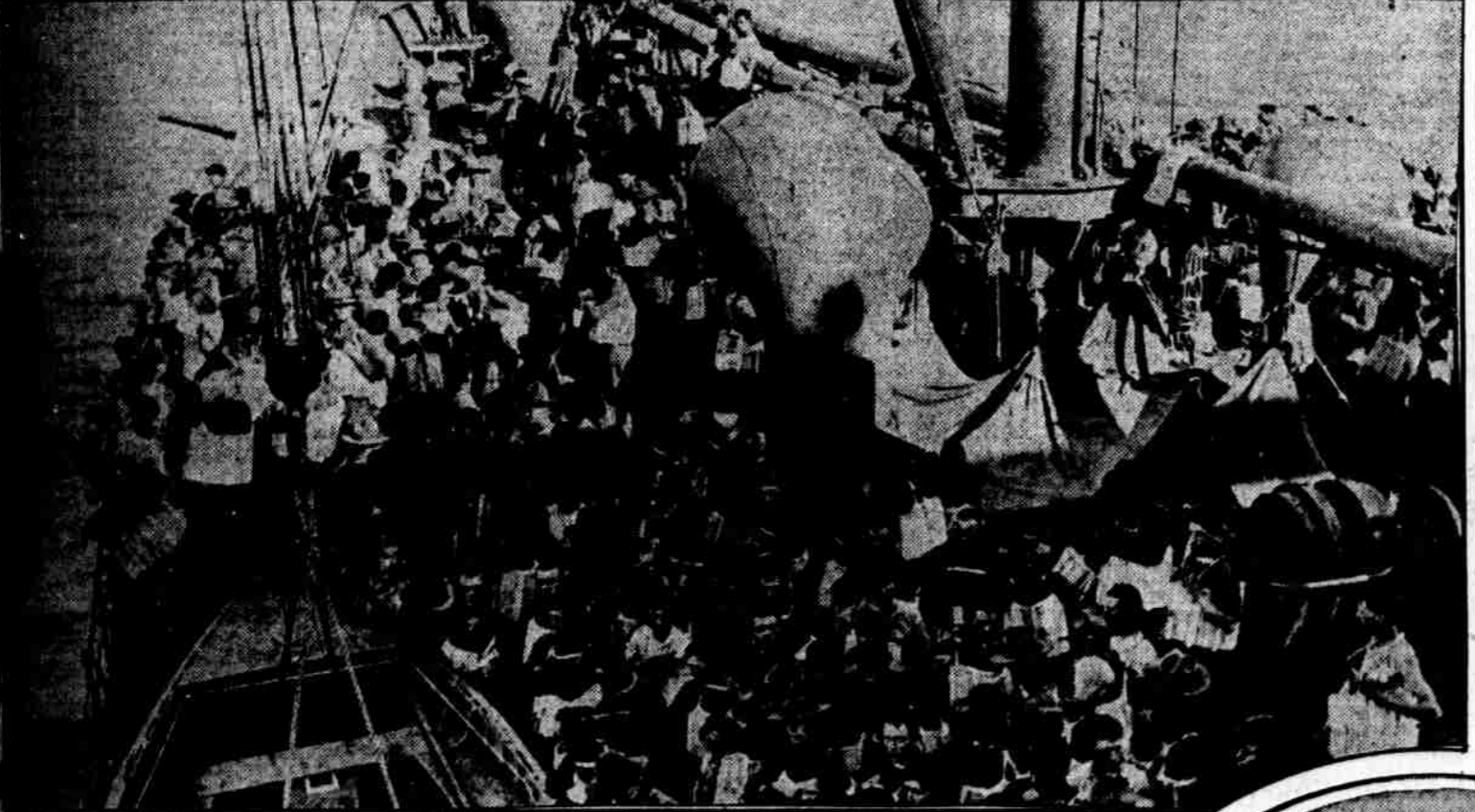


CROWDED TRANSPORTS AMERICA'S RINGING REPLY TO GERMAN JEERS OF "JUST YANKEE BLUFF"

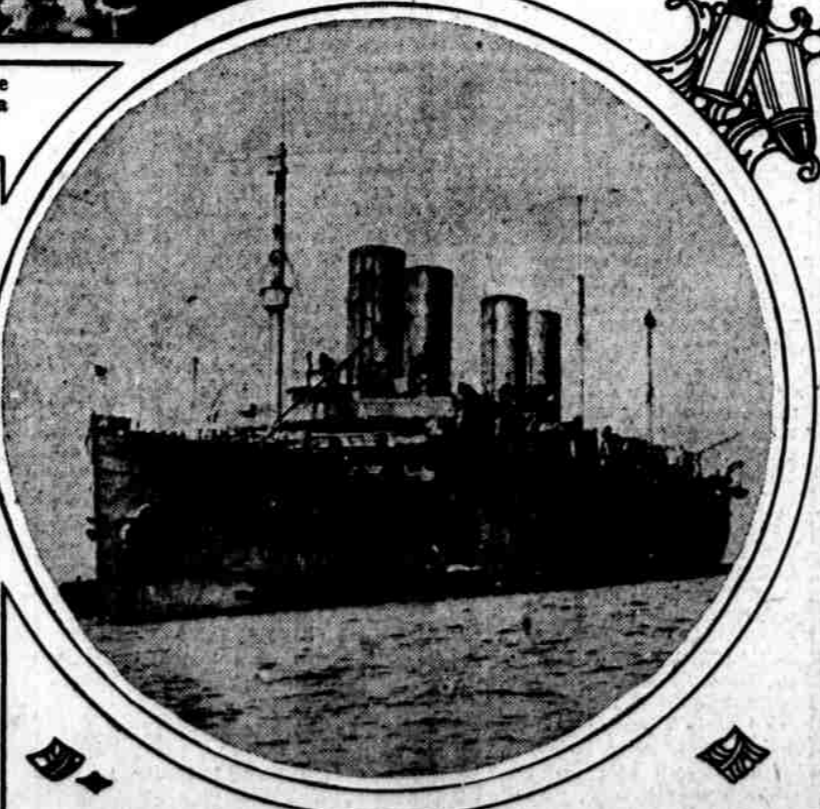

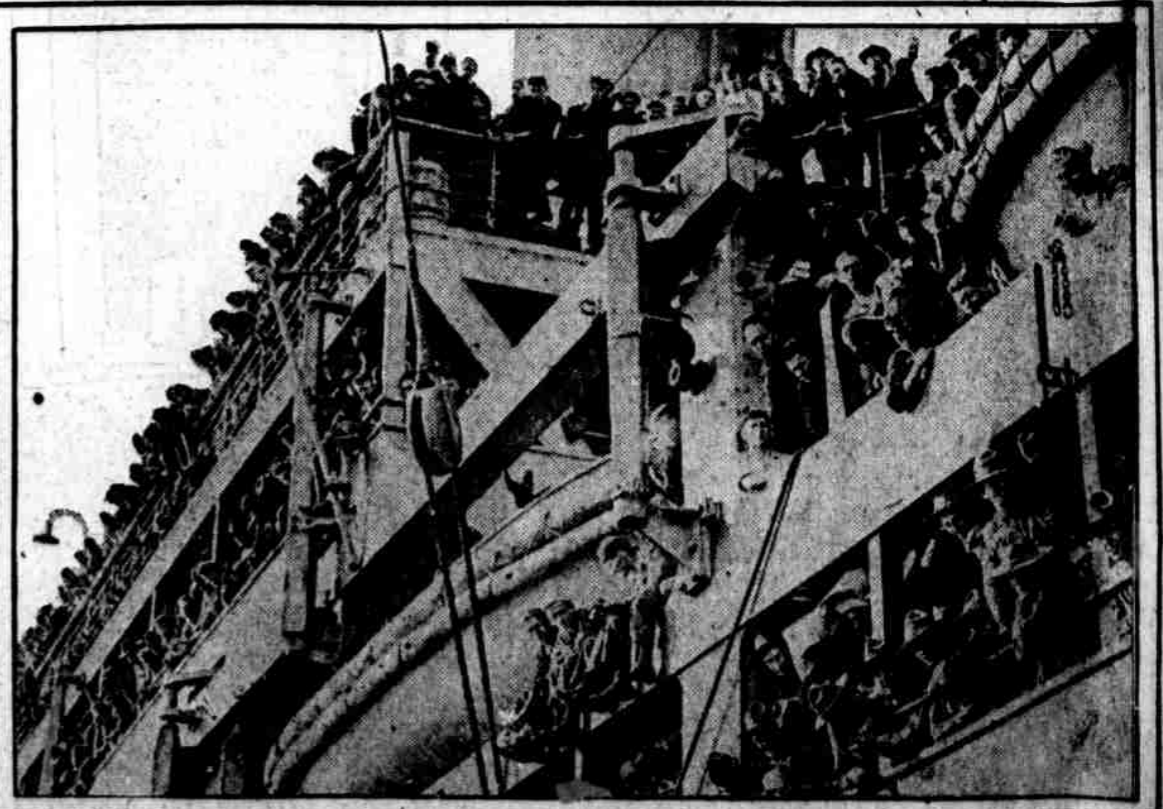
