LOSSES OF U. S. SHIPS FAR UNDER OUTPUT

U-Boat Inroads Under Sevenths of One Per Cent for Quarter

By the United Press Washington, Sept. 5. American shipping losses from submarine raids in American waters were less than seven-tenths of one per cent in the last three months.

Germany's effort at strangulation of American's transatlantic shipping have been severely checked by the bottom since May 24. These represent a total net in excess of 1,000,000 deadweight tons, according to figures compiled here today.

One Ton in Seventy The actual loss to transatlantic shipping, however, falls far below the percentage shown. Only about twenty of the seventy vessels meeting disaster at the hands of the U-boat, under the craft were of the ocean-going type.

Shipping officials today believed the tonnage situation was daily growing easier. It was pointed out that the great increase in production would release some of the smaller vessels now in transatlantic service for coastwise and inter-American traffic.
