May 24. These represent a total not Set away until about 9 o'clock. in excess of 100,000 deadweight tons. according to figures compiled here today.

Basing their statements on figures made public by Chairman Hurley that the United States Shipping Board controlled 7,000,000 tons, officials otimated that the net losses were one ton in each seventy leaving American ports.

One Ton in Seventy

The actual loss to transatlantic shipping, however, falls far below the percentage shown. Only about twenty of the seventy vessels meeting disaster at the hands of the Teutonic undersea craft were of the occan-going type. Their deadweight tonnage aggregated something like 62,000.

Breaking all records, the shipyards turned out 340,000 deadweight tons in August, which is 60,000 tons more than the best previous record of 280,000 tons The August figure represents an ic

The August figure represents an increase of 114,000 tons over the July production of 225,000 tons.

Shipping officials today believed the tonnage situation was daily growing easier. It was pointed out that the great increase in production would release some of the smaller vessels now in transatlantic service for coastwise. and inter-American traffic.
