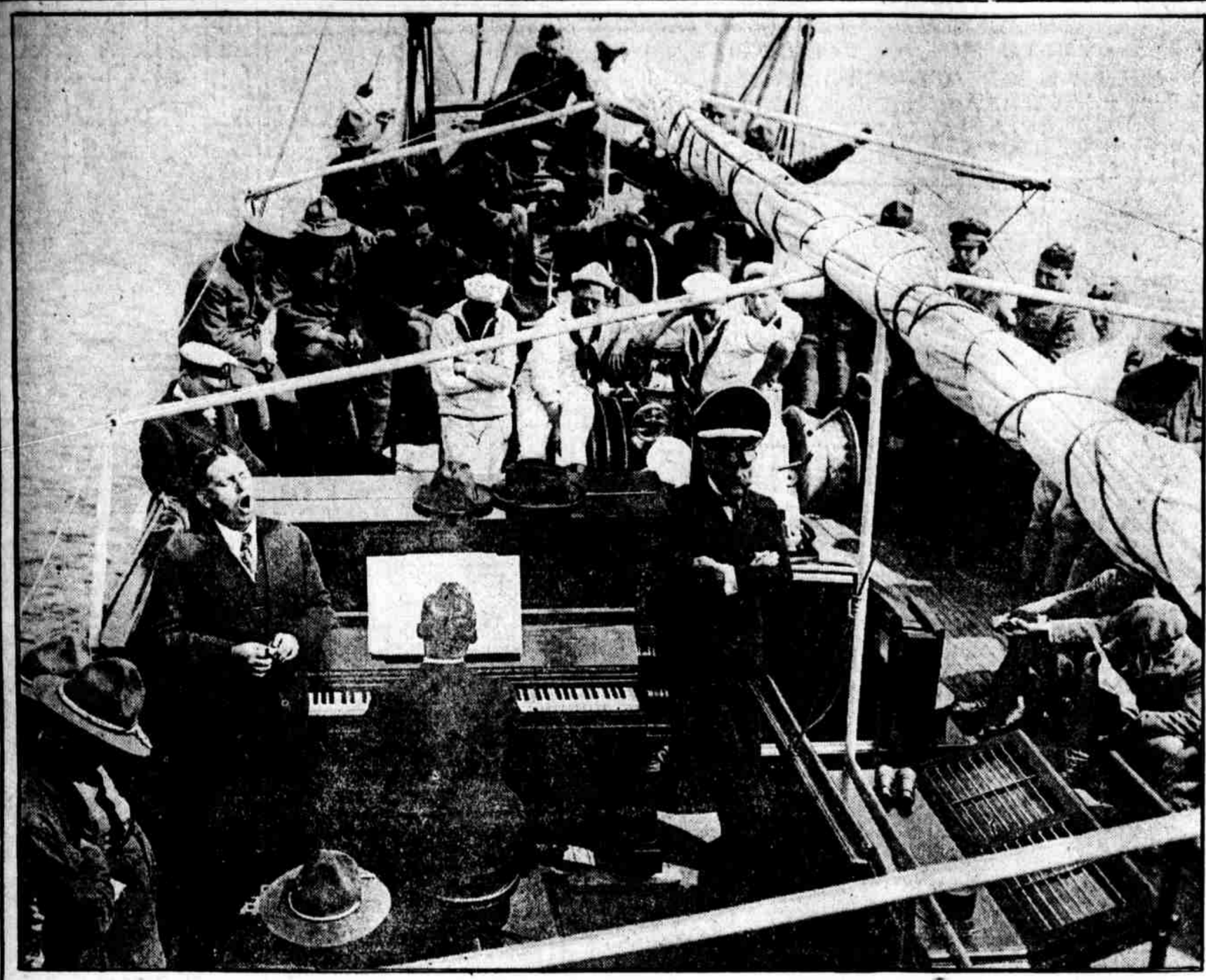


A PICTORIAL RESUME OF WHO'S WHO IN THE WHIRL OF HAPPENINGS HERE AT HOME, AND ABROAD
