Seventy-four Army Men and Three Marines Killed in Action—31 Other Deaths—24 Reported Missing—128 Wounded

Washington, Sept. 18. The War Department today announced an army casualty list of 126 names, and one of the marine corps containing twenty-two names. Last night's army list had 147 names, making a total of 295 names for the three reports. Army casualties reported today include: Killed in action, thirty-seven; missing in action, seven; wounded severely, seventy-four; died from wounds, three; died from disease, one; missing in action, ten. These bring the total marine casualties to date up to 410.
