

711 NAMES ON THREE U.S. CASUALTY LISTS

Pershing Loses 154 Men in Battle and Marine Corps Eighteen—144 Deaths From Other Causes—134 Reported Missing and 260 Wounded

Washington, Sept. 23. A total of 711 names appear on three United States casualty lists given out by the War Department today and last night. Today's lists are for the army with 336 names, and one from the marine corps, with 37 names. The army list given out last night contains 338 names.

The lists announced today are divided as follows: Army, killed in action, 78; missing in action, 59; wounded severely, 131; died of disease, 12; died from wounds, 47; died of accident and other causes, 6; died from airplane accident, 1; wounded, degree undetermined, 4. Marine Corps, killed in action, 18; died of wounds, 4; wounded severely, 1; missing in action, 14; in hands of enemy, 2.

Last night's army list included: Killed in action, 78; missing in action, 59; wounded severely, 131; died of disease, 12; died from wounds, 47; died of accident and other causes, 6; died from airplane accident, 1; wounded, degree undetermined, 4; died of disease, 14; died from accident and other causes, 11.
