

THREE U. S. CASUALTY REPORTS TOTAL 269

Pushing Loses 121 Men in Battle—One Marine Slain. Ten Others Die From Various Causes—Thirty-nine of Both Forces Listed as Missing

Washington, Sept. 24. Casualty lists of the army and marine corps announced by the War Department today and an army list given out last night contain a total of 269 names. The army list of last night had 129 names divided as follows: killed in action, 66; missing in action, 12; wounded severely, 24; died from wounds, 9; died from accident, 1; died from disease, 2; wounded, degree undetermined, 2; wounded slightly, 2. Today's list of the army, numbering 119, included: Killed in action, 55; missing in action, 12; wounded severely, 22; died from wounds, 12; died from airplane accident, 1; died from accident and other causes, 2; died from disease, 2; wounded, degree undetermined, 1; prisoners, 5. Twenty-one marine corps casualties include: Killed in action, 1; died from wounds, 1; wounded severely, 7; wounded, degree undetermined, 1; missing in action, 10; in hands of enemy, 1. The summary of the army casualties to date follows: Killed in action 6169, Lost at sea 291, Died of wounds 2038, Died of accident and other causes 883, Died of disease 1829. Total deaths 11,150, Wounded 17,873, Missing, including prisoners 4,730. Grand total 23,753. The summary of the marine corps casualties follows: Officers Enlisted men Deaths 29 1069, Wounded 65 1946, Missing 1 158, In hands of enemy 15. Totals 105 3129, Grand total 3234. REVISE CAPTIVES LIST Six Americans Were Reported as Prisoners Through Error Washington, Sept. 24.—The War Department has made public the names of six men previously reported prisoners in Germany who, it now develops, either were wounded or killed in action. Private Wellman Hunter, of Spring Valley, Wis., was killed in action, while Private Martin F. Williams, of Brooklyn, W. Va., died of wounds received in action. Corporal Lawrence Boyer, of Toronto, O., and Private William B. Adams, of Cleveland, Isaac Bollinger, of Brookville, Mo., and Gilmore Brown, of Brookville, Pa., are reported as wounded and in hospitals, but the department was unable to say whether they were in American or German institutions. REVENUE PRUNING OPENS IN SENATE

Finance Committee Starts Work on \$8,000,000,000 Measure

THOMAS LEADS ATTACK Colorado Member Calls Levy Too Large and Foresees Harm to Business

Washington, Sept. 24. With the Senate Finance Committee prepared to start revision of the \$8,000,000,000 revenue bill today, Senate criticism of the measure opened yesterday with an address by Senator Thomas, of Colorado, a Democratic member of the committee. Senator Thomas asserted the bill which was passed unanimously by the House last week will hurt business. He said the levy is too large, that it is wrong in principle to fix arbitrarily the proportion of the money raised by taxation at one-third of the total expenditures. "These figures are nearly one and one-half times the total supply of our currency, including gold, silver, nickel, copper and paper. It represents 4 per cent of our estimated wealth. It exceeds the combined value of our imports and exports for any one year. It would more than liquidate the money cost of our Civil War on both sides. It will subject the industries of the nation to a supreme test of endurance. It virtually will absorb the annual profits of production and must be made to do so, if possible, without discouraging continued productive energy. Senator Thomas went on to say that it "seemed to be disregarded" that the

proposed tax constituted but a part of the burden that will fall upon the taxpayer. He cited the State, county, school and municipal taxes whose aggregate, he said, was prodigious. In 1916 he said the revenues of the States totaled \$465,848,748, and he estimated that they would approximate \$2,000,000,000 this year. He quoted Mr. Kitchin, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, as giving the total individual incomes subject to income tax at \$4,700,000,000 and corporation income for the same period at \$10,000,000,000, an aggregate of \$14,700,000,000. "With enactment of this bill, \$10,000,000,000 must be used for purposes of general taxation," said Senator Thomas. "Less than 20 per cent of this fund will remain with the taxpayer whose needs must absorb a much larger portion if his earning capacity shall remain unimpaired. Not all of these taxes are imposed on incomes, but they are passed along and ultimately rest on that form of wealth, for taxes upon consumption, whether direct or indirect, must be finally defrayed from the earnings of the taxpayer." Taking up the constitutional features of the bill, Senator Thomas said: "This bill is obnoxious to the Constitution of the United States in not less than three important particulars—the

proposed taxation of presidential and judicial salaries, of State and municipal salaries and salaries and the alternative method of assessing and levying taxes by the war-profits method or the excess-profits method, which would clothe the Government with authority, as stated in the bill, to resort to whichever of the two methods will yield the higher amount of taxes. It may be that the constitutional principle of uniformity in taxation is seriously jeopardized by the restriction of these taxes to corporations only."



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
