

S. TO FIX PRICE ON NECESSITIES

Policy of Control Will Provide Fair Measure of Profits

WILSON TO TAKE ACTION

Expected to Outline Wage Regulation Adjusted to Living Cost

Washington, Sept. 28.—Government regulation of retail prices of food, clothing and other necessities and the "equitable limitation of profits" has been forecast officially by Felix Frankfurter, special Assistant Secretary of Labor and chairman of the war labor policies board, as the only basis for a successful labor policy.

Resolutions adopted by the war labor policies board calling upon the war industries board, the food and fuel administration and the Department of Agriculture to proceed as rapidly as possible with the formulation and enforcement of such a program were made public.

Mr. Frankfurter said the "tremendous difficulties inherent in undertaking price control" are thoroughly appreciated, but "like other great problems presented by the war, this undertaking must be pursued because the successful enforcement of labor policies is inextricably bound up with all these conditions usually called the cost of living."

A statement by President Wilson within the next few days is expected to outline a program of wage adjustment, which will be based to a very large extent on the proposed policy of stabilizing prices by Government measures.

Announcements by the Department of Labor Bureau of Statistics on the abnormal increase in the cost of living in Philadelphia, Boston and New York intended to show how prices of necessities are soaring, so that there might be a general understanding of the problems confronting the wage-adjustment agencies of the Government in meeting the demands of workers for increased compensation.

The investigations of the Department of Labor in industrial centers have shown the great increases in living costs, even though the food administration contended this week the food bill of the nation has increased 3 1/2 per cent during the twelve months ending September 1.

Price control offers the biggest economic problem yet confronted by the Administration, and it is believed here the President will go to Congress to explain the necessity for the step if it is determined that legislation will be required. It is a problem, officials say, that goes to the very heart of the business of the nation, and one that cannot be solved without extended debate by the interests involved.

Roma, 27 settembre. Secondo informazioni qui giunte la situazione in Rumenia diventa allarmante per le potenze centrali.

Locali rivolte sono già avvenute in parecchi punti. Il governo rumeno ha inviato agenti a Berlino e Vienna per ottenere che siano mitigate le imposizioni dell'Austria-Ungheria.

Un dispaccio giunto in Svizzera alla Gazzetta di Losanna reca che l'irritazione pubblica in Costantinopoli è diventata così grande, da dover costringersi il governo turco a cercare una pace separata. Il sultano stesso sarebbe in favore di una tale pace se le potenze dell'Intesa potessero accordare alla Turchia favorevoli condizioni.

Washington, 27 settembre. Disparati giunti ad autorità diplomatiche assicurano che l'Austria sta invadendo rinforzi alla Bulgaria, le di cui armate sono impuntate a resistere all'avanzata delle truppe Alleate.

Parigi, 27 settembre. Rapporti giunti dal fronte di battaglia dello Champagne, tra i fiumi Sappe e Meuse, indicano che l'attacco delle forze francesi ed americane è in progresso al di là di tutta la linea, sotto le più favorevoli condizioni.

La quarta Armata del Generale Gouard ha ripreso il fronte di battaglia di Champagne, questa mattina, tra le posizioni catturate ai tedeschi durante la giornata di ieri. L'attacco progredisce con successo. I francesi hanno cennato tutto i loro obiettivi.

Il rapporto del Ministero della Guerra, oggi pubblicato, dice del successo nello sviluppo dell'offensiva e la ripresa dell'attacco da parte delle truppe francesi. Le truppe americane attaccano a nord-ovest di Verdun pare che abbia ottenuto tutto e più di quello che si attendevano.

Sopra l'intero campo di attacco per i francesi, tra il fiume Sappe ed i boschi di Argonne, le formidabili posizioni tedesche di una profondità di due miglia sono state brillantemente espugnate.

I francesi hanno catturato il Butte du Meunier, il Butte du Souain, il Butte du Chabre ed i villaggi di Tahure, Ripont, Nouvroy, Cernay-en-Dormois e Servon-Melscourt.

Più di settemila prigionieri furono presi dai francesi. Gli americani prigionieri avevano riportato di aver catturato 5000 prigionieri, portando così il totale a 12,000.

PERSHING REPORTS 387 U. S. CASUALTIES

67 Men From Keystone and Nearby States Pay War's Toll on Battlefields of France—84 American Soldiers Are Killed in Action

Washington, Sept. 28.—Army casualty lists issued by the War Department today and last night contain 193 and 194 names, respectively. Sixty-seven men from Pennsylvania and nearby States are listed.

Today's list includes: Killed in action, 47; missing in action, 10; wounded severely, 92; died from wounds, 27; died from airplane accident, 1; died from accident and other causes, 4; died of disease, 10.

Last night's list is divided as follows: Killed in action, 55; missing in action, 10; wounded severely, 82; died from wounds, 27; died from airplane accident, 1; died from accident and other causes, 4; died of disease, 13; prisoners.

PITTSBURGHER HELD AS SPY
Banning Alleged to Be Head of Enemy Work in Region

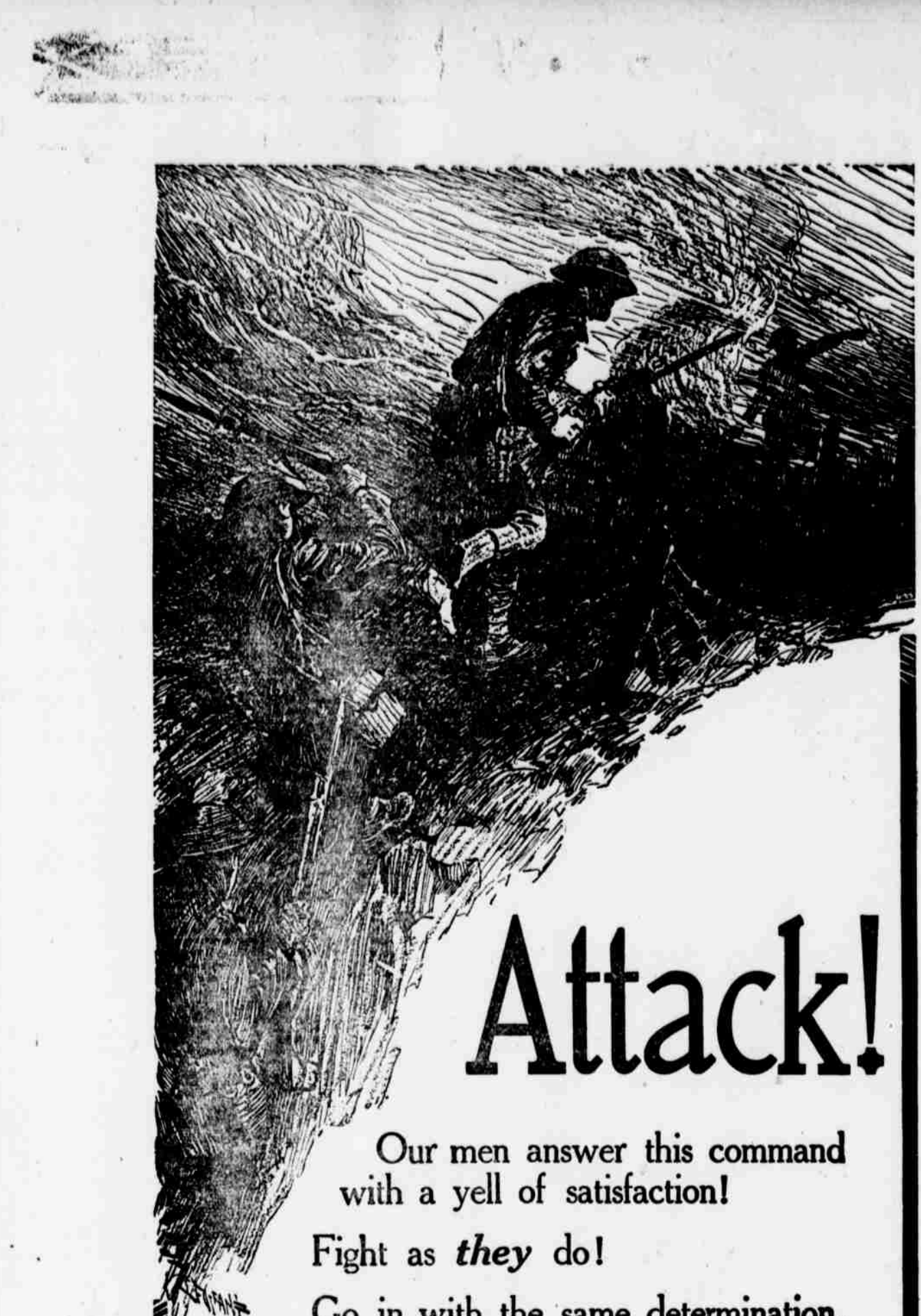
