

U. S. CASUALTIES ON 3 REPORTS TOTAL 1118

Record Number for One Day Since America Entered the War—Soldiers and Marines Killed in Action 194—Other Deaths 125

Washington, Oct. 2. Casualties among the American expeditionary forces in France were increased to 1118 by reports given out by the War Department today and last night, the largest number announced in any twenty-four hours since the United States entered the war.

Today's army list of 556 is divided as follows: Killed in action, 93; missing in action, 42; wounded severely, 347; died of disease, 21; died of accident and other causes, 41; died from wounds, 38; wounded slightly, 5; prisoners, 4.

The summary of the army casualties to date follows: Lost at sea, 491; killed in action, 2189; died of disease, 239; died of accident and other causes, 332; died of wounds, 1932.

Before the American advance the Germans littered the country with tank mines, apparently anticipating a withdrawal. Scores of British-made tanks, many of them manned by American crews, are co-operating in the American advance.

These American tank crews were trained in England and had been waiting behind the front for the attack. They rolled along before the infantry and directly in the rear of a creeping barrage and cleared many machine-gun nests.

After the manner of the British, the Americans drove their machines right on top of the Germans, crushing down men, guns and nests. Some of the crews came out of the fight with their tractors dripping with blood, showing how completely they had accomplished the task assigned to them.
