

RUMANIA EAGER TO RESUME WAR

Take Jonescu Declares His Nation Will Hurl Army Into Struggle

BATTLE FOR HOMETLAND Will Blast Bucharest Peace. Urges Allies to Invade Germany

By the Associated Press. Paris, Oct. 2.—The Allies have succeeded in ending hostilities in Macedonia. It is to be hoped that we will also succeed in reaching an agreement which will bring about lasting peace among the Balkan nations.

“Rumania must get back the territory on the other side of the Danube now occupied by the Bulgars,” he continued. “It is indispensable toward economic life and would in no wise be a Bulgarian capitulation. Bulgaria would have advantages which would more than counterbalance the mere withdrawal of her army from this territory.”

“Allied troops will approach the Danube and the Rumanian army will take up the guns wrenched from it by the so-called peace of Bucharest. The handful of German soldiers, who sought to dishonor their country, will scatter. The new Rumanian army will exceed in valor the old one. It is as a believer that I am speaking to you and I am sure that you and they should be no peace until the Allies enter Germany.”

Patrons are Popular. Most of the popular generals in the Rumanian army today are those who showed themselves most hostile to the conclusion of peace.

The state of mind in the country districts may be gathered from the fact that German military requisitions, which have exceeded all stipulations under the treaty of peace, have been transformed into nothing less than simple plunder with no regard for peace conditions. The longer that German occupation continues, have become more worse than those which prevailed during the war itself. The last news received here from Rumania tends to show that hostilities have broken out in several places against the German occupation.

BULGARIA BEGINS TO DISBAND ARMY

By the United Press. London, Oct. 2.—Bulgaria has already started disbanding military units which she was granted an armistice. It was learned from authoritative sources today that the Bulgarian army is being disbanded. Arms and munitions are being handed over to the Allies. Former troops are taking charge of the railways.

ARMISTICE STOPPED ALLIES IN MACEDONIA

By the Associated Press. Paris, Oct. 2.—The Allied forces in Macedonia continue their progress until midway of September. The French war office statement last night. On September 20, up to noon, the hour fixed for the suspension of hostilities according to the armistice, the Allied armies continued this progress under favorable conditions. The Serbian army occupies the mountainous region of Gradiste and Plavice, between Eskub and the Bulgarian frontier. To the west the Allied troops advanced to the frontier of the lake of Ohrid. The west of Lake Ohrid the Austrian forces continue to resist vigorously.

GERMANS EVACUATE PSKOFF State Department Hears Living in Petrograd is Hopeless

Washington, Oct. 2.—The State Department has received word in a telegram from Stockholm, dated September 30, of the situation prevailing in Pskoff, Russia as reported to the Swedish press by persons returning from Petrograd. Passengers arriving on the steamship from the Russian capital declared that the living conditions in that city are hopeless. The life of everybody, it was asserted, is in danger from a lack of food, and foreigners there are strictly forbidden. Butter is \$12 a pound. A recent decree allows to each person one suit of clothes, two pairs of shoes and three shirts. The dispatch stated that German troops have evacuated Pskoff and the surrounding districts. Fighting is in progress between German soldiers and the Ukrainians at Kornev, in which the Germans have lost 1500 men. The Swedish press confirms reports that the Turks are sacking and burning Baku, on the Caspian.

ILLINOIS MEN DASH SIX MILES Swoop Captures Prisoners and Also German Luncheon

By the Associated Press. Verdun, Oct. 2.—Illinois troops dashing part in the offensive between the Meuse and the Argonne, have advanced more than six miles on the first day of the attack, the unit reaching its objective hours ahead of the rest of the line. The Illinois men pushed forward just to the west of the Meuse, starting from the neighborhood of Verdun. They headed directly north until half way to their destination, where they turned to the northeast. Their advance was so rapid that in the region of Vercourt-Verlaine they came upon a party of Germans just about to sit down to a luncheon in the dugout. The party was overcome and a German soldier, who was one of the group, was shot in the head. He was attempting to escape. The Illinois soldiers helped themselves to the German luncheon of beer, red cabbage and black bread. Seven German beer, a supply of wine and a German typewriter were found in the dugout. The wounded colors of the Illinois were captured at the rapidity of the offensive advance.

WAR NEWS SUMMARY BEARS TIDINGS OF ALLIED VICTORY

By the Associated Press. Germany's defenses between Cambrai and St. Quentin are crumbling under the determined blows of Marshal Foch, and the time of the expected German withdrawal from France and Belgium apparently is drawing appreciably nearer. Under the attacks of French, French and American troops, the Hindenburg defense system that stretches from the Oise, a distance of fifty miles, is being overrun in the north. In the south the French are proceeding vigorously their advance west and north of Rheims.

Northeast of the front the British have advanced more than five miles westward from the front line of the Hindenburg positions. A salient, most dangerous to the enemy, has been driven in between St. Quentin and La Cotele, and the British are advancing through a big gap in the enemy line toward important roads and railways across the Argonne, one of the most important traffic centers west of the German border.

Cambrai has not yet been captured by the British, but Field Marshal Haig reports that the British are now in the town and east of the Scheldt canal.

HAIG BREAKS GERMAN LINES BELOW CAMBRAI

Paris, Oct. 2.—The Germans are moving their heavy artillery away from the Belgian coast, according to reports here today.

The Belgian army, co-operating with the British army of General Plumer and the French army of General De Gaulle, successfully continued today their heavy attacks on the Flanders front.

The Allied enveloping movement against Turcoigne, Roulehem and Lille is becoming accentuated, according to a semi-official announcement made here today. General De Gaulle, now operating in the vicinity of Roulehem, apparently has sent north from his old position on the left of General Mangin after the break through of the Belgian and British forces was definitely established.

By the Associated Press. Paris, Oct. 2.—The French troops having captured St. Quentin, have passed beyond that town, Northeast, east and southeast of the town, according to the Havas Agency, they hold a line running along the Somme from Trossy to Rouvray and then along the St. Quentin-Lagny road to the River Oise, at Vendouilly.

Heavy fighting took place in St. Quentin last night. Resisting stubbornly, the Germans were driven back to the east bank of the canal, according to the French War Office statement today.

The armies of Generals Gouraud and Berthelot on the fronts east and west of Rheims continued to advance today against the Germans, who appeared to be falling back more hurriedly than at any time since September 26.

General Berthelot's army is making good progress between the Meuse River and the Aisne Canal. The French troops have captured five or six more villages and their advance at some points reached a depth of one or three to four miles. The entire front of St. Thierry is now in French hands.

West and northwest of Rheims General Berthelot's troops yesterday had taken Pontillon and Thionville, the outskirts of Villers-Francais, North of Rheims they had advanced to the outskirts of Bethlany.

St. Quentin is taken and the communication of the Hindenburg system has fallen. Thanks to the prodigious and unrelenting efforts of the armies of General De Gaulle and General Rawlinson, under the general direction of General Fayolle, that fine soldier who commands the group of armies in that sector, it is a most resounding triumph. But it is as we see it where victory smiles upon the Allied arms.

Belgian forces, strongly opposed, are making headway toward Roulehem and Meuse. The Germans are endeavoring to evacuate the Lille region. British armies around Cambrai are successively fighting one of the fiercest battles of the war. General Berthelot is driving the enemy back between Rheims and the Aisne and General Gouraud has reached Chateau-Thierry, an important railroad center at the west.
