

### LEADERS OUT FOR SPROUL

**Prominent Clergymen Call for Election of All Foes of Saloons**

**SEE ISSUE PARAMOUNT**

**Liquor Men, They Declare, Have Made Rum Biggest Campaign Question**

Representatives of seven of the largest church denominations in the State have issued an appeal to churchmen to vote for Senator William C. Sproul, Republican gubernatorial nominee, and the legislative candidates who are pledged to the ratification of the national prohibition amendment.

The appeal will be sent to 7000 pastors in all parts of Pennsylvania by a group of Philadelphia church leaders.

Clergymen will be urged to bring the appeal to the attention of their congregations for the purpose of uniting the big church vote in the State on Senator Sproul and the senatorial and legislative candidates who are pledged to the prohibition amendment.

"The liquor men and their allies in this State," the appeal sets forth, "have definitely 'advised' pastors and are almost solidly united to elect men from the governorship downward who are pledged to defeat that ratification, without questioning any political affiliations they may have had in the past."

Those signing the appeal are Bishop Joseph F. Berry, of the Methodist Episcopal Church; Dr. Russell H. Conwell, pastor of the Baptist Temple and president of Temple University; Rev. Floyd W. Tomkins, rector of Holy Trinity Church; Rev. A. J. Rowland, secretary emeritus of the American Baptist Publication Society; Rev. J. Gray Bolton, of the Presbytery of Philadelphia; Rev. Rufus W. Miller, chairman of the Reformed Church in the United States; and Dr. Homer W. Tope, Lutheran clergyman, general synod, and superintendent of the Pennsylvania Anti-Saloon League.

**The Appeal**

The appeal follows:

We beg to address you in this letter as patriotic Christian men seeking to accept with you a supreme opportunity that God and our nation's Congress have given to us in answer to our prayers and petitions of the half century past.

On November 5, at the ballot-boxes, Pennsylvania will have her only opportunity to elect a Legislature pledged to the ratification of the amendment to the Federal Constitution providing for future nationwide prohibition of the liquor traffic.

Already we are warned that upon this one issue, made paramount to the situation, the liquor men and their allies in this State have, definitely 'advised' pastors and are almost solidly united to elect men from the governorship downward who are pledged to defeat that ratification, without questioning any political affiliations they may have had in the past.

**A Concluding Call**

In the face of that alignment there comes what we regard as a compelling call to all Christian patriotic voters to rally every man possible to the pole on November 5, to vote for William C. Sproul for Governor, and senators and Representatives who are quietly and squarely pledged to work for the ratification of the afore-mentioned amendment.

In this way only can we make our past prayers effective and convert our great opportunity into certain victory. May we not rely upon you, our fellow churchmen, to join devoutly in those efforts and to that result?

Dr. John Royal Harris, State superintendent of the Dry Federation of Pennsylvania, has issued another indorsement of the candidacy of Senator William C. Sproul. He also urges support for the senatorial and legislative candidates who are pledged to vote for the ratification of the national prohibition amendment.

Eleven of the thirteenth members of the Dry Federation's executive committee voted for the original indorsement of the Sproul candidacy.

"Confirmation of the justice and wisdom of this course has been coming in ever since," says Doctor Harris in an explanatory note.

"The liquor men are getting behind the candidacy of Municipal Court Judge Bonniwell, and attacking Mr. Sproul on every kind of ground. A wide publicity campaign against him is being backed by the more dangerous rumshoe kind, and they appeal to various prejudices."

Municipal Judge Bonniwell, Democratic gubernatorial nominee, renewed his threat last night to rip Mayor Smith out of office and curb the power of the 'Yates' if he is elected Governor, at a series of rallies for industrial workers. To a delegation of members of the

**Policemen's Sentiment and Protective Association, Judge Bonniwell declared he favored the establishment of a metropolitan police force in Philadelphia which forever would eliminate the police from politics.**

"As Governor," said Judge Bonniwell to the police delegation, "I shall favor the establishment of a metropolitan police system that will absolutely divorce the faithful, efficient policemen of the city of Philadelphia from political control, protect them against either coercion or financial assessment by drastic penalties and assure them the compensation which they justly deserve in the form of a satisfactory minimum wage."

Personal letters were sent by Judge Bonniwell yesterday to some Democratic committeemen in the State.

"Give the President the most grateful indorsement that he could receive—the election of the whole Democratic ticket," is the message of Judge Bonniwell to the committeemen.

Election of Justice Alexander Simpson Jr. to succeed himself as a member of the Supreme Court is urged by 1500 Philadelphia lawyers, who are members of the general committee formed to bring about the election of Justice Simpson.

Members of the bar were urged to man the polls next Tuesday at a meeting held in behalf of the Simpson candidacy in the Adelphi Hotel.

Chief Justice Brown, former Judge A. M. Bettler and others spoke. Joseph Gillilan presided in place of Congressman George S. Graham, who was unable to attend.

An executive committee in charge of the campaign comprises Hampton L. Carson, A. M. Bettler, M. Hampton Todd, ex-Judge Mayoy Sulzberger, Walter George Smith, William A. Glasgow, Jr., Joseph Gillilan and J. B. Colahan, Jr.

Through an error in the certification of his nomination for Congress, Eugene Clinton, Fair Play and Democratic candidate from the Fifth District, appears on the printed ballots for next Tuesday's election as the candidate of the Town Meeting and Democratic parties. The Town Meeting party candidate was Senator Councilman William Horn, who retired. A messenger has been dispatched to Harrisburg in an effort to have the mistake rectified.

Support for Senator Sproul and the entire Republican ticket was urged at three West Philadelphia ward rallies by Republican City Committee speakers.

Speakers declared that the prohibition question would be decided by the next Legislature and not by the Governor.

The meetings were held at Fifty-second street and Haverford avenue; Chestnut street above Fortieth, and Sixty-first and Vine streets.

**WOMAN LOSES FILM SUIT**

Camden Movie Proprietor Is Denied Monopoly of Charlie Chaplin

Mrs. Alice Woodruff, proprietor of the Colonial Theatre, Camden, lost an appeal to Vice-Chancellor Leaning today.

She asked that the First National Exhibitors' Exchange, of Philadelphia, be prevented from selling Charlie Chaplin films to any other Camden exhibitor. She said she had a contract with the company for exclusive use. This, she says, was violated. She failed to produce the contract, and the appeal was dismissed.

Daniel Black, for twenty-one years a patrolman of the Belgrade and Clearfield police station, died at his home, 2019 Elkhart street, last night. He suffered a general breakdown several months ago and has been ill since then. He was forty-eight years old. A wife and two sons survive him.

**N. Y. MOTORMEN STRIKE FAVORS INDUSTRIAL ACT**

**600 B. N. T. Employees Refused to Go to Work Today**

New York, Nov. 3.—The strike called by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers to enforce an order of the war labor board for the reinstatement of twenty-nine discharged motormen of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, did not materially affect the operation of trains early today. It was estimated that about twenty per cent of the 600 motormen on subway and elevated lines had failed to report for work at 5 o'clock when the strike order became effective.

The Governor has assured the Commissioner of Labor that in addition to recommending the acceptance by the

Legislature of the act, he will also take steps which will make effective the appropriation which it will be necessary for the Legislature to make for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the bill.
