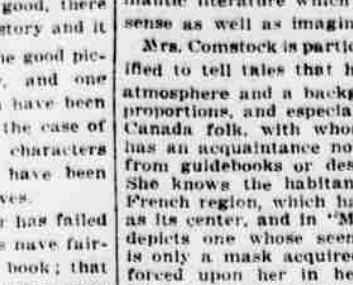
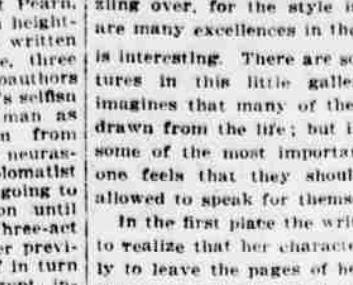
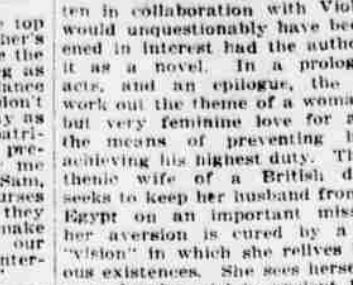
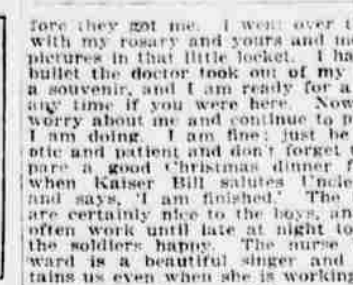
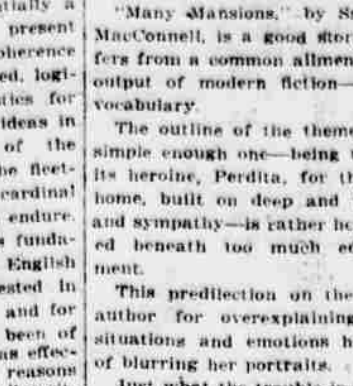
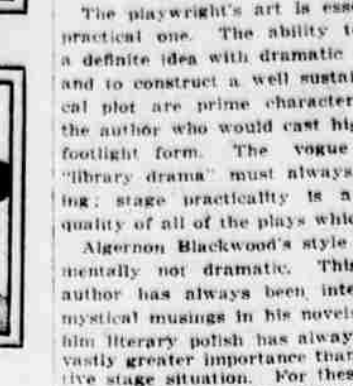
SHARP CONTRASTS "MANY MANSIONS" MAM'SEILE JO REAL HEROINE

From Page One. It was known he was removed to a base hospital at that time, but all efforts to obtain additional information concerning him have failed.

Two Officers Wounded. The young lieutenant in his active command of Company K, 110th Infantry, at Abbeville, a town south of the front.

Private George Archer, previously reported wounded, appears on today's War Department list. He was struck in the right shoulder and arm by a bullet fired from a machine gun on September 14.

Private Herbert O. Madara, First Battalion, 10th Infantry, was wounded on July 16 during the battle of the Marne. He is twenty-three years old and is now in a base hospital.

Private Howard V. Young was first reported on October 2, 1917, as wounded. He was wounded in the right leg and arm by a bullet fired from a machine gun on September 14.

Private Roy C. Wilson was wounded in the right leg by shrapnel on October 16, according to a letter received by his mother, Mrs. J. C. Wilson, 2721 North Twelfth street.

Private Edward Davis, 10th Infantry, was wounded on July 25, 1917, by a bullet fired from a machine gun. He is now in a base hospital.

Private Israel Abrams, wounded in action on September 12, lived with his wife, Mrs. H. Abrams, at 604 West 12th street. The telegram he received by Mrs. Mary Greenbaum, 606 Watkins street.

Private Charles W. Jones, wounded in action, a member of the old 10th Infantry, was wounded in the right leg by shrapnel during the Mexican border campaign. The official report states that he is recovering in a letter received by his mother, Mrs. H. Jones, 1212 North 12th street.

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Private Joseph C. Ireland was wounded in action on July 16, 1917, by a bullet fired from a machine gun. He is now in a base hospital.

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
