Americans Throw Germans Into Confusion—Kaiser's Armies Face Disaster

Ghent Reported Taken Haig Sweeps Forward on 35-Mile Front Below Scheldt. Reaches Annellé

The German army on the western front faces disaster. The Americans are rapidly pressing toward Sedan and have passed Stenay on the west in pursuit of the enemy.

By the United Press London, Nov. 4.—The Americans extended their attack to take of the Meuse this morning. It was announced in an official American communique.

The center of the Meuse, the Americans have passed Stenay, a vital point on the foe's line on the west, and are within a mile and a quarter of the important town of Beaumont.

By the Associated Press Washington, Nov. 4.—The First American Army has captured dominating heights from the German north of Verdun, and brought under the fire of its heavy guns the important railroad at Montigny and the town of Longchamps.

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AUSTRIA IS RENDERED POWERLESS BY DRASTIC ARMISTICE TERMS; ARMED FORCES YIELD TO ALLIES

Text of Truce Terms Allies Grant Austria

By the Associated Press Washington, Nov. 4.—The terms of an armistice, under which the land and sea forces of what once was the Austro-Hungarian empire have laid down their arms, were announced simultaneously in Washington and the Allied capitals.

The terms follow: Military Clauses. 1. The immediate cessation of hostilities by land, sea and air. 2. Total demobilization of the Austro-Hungarian army and immediate withdrawal of all Austro-Hungarian forces operating on the front from the North Sea to Switzerland.

Evacuation of all territories invaded by Austro-Hungary since the beginning of the war. Withdrawal within such periods as shall be determined by the commander-in-chief of the Allied forces on each front of the Austro-Hungarian armies behind the line fixed as follows: From Pic Umbell to the north of the Stelvio.

Evacuation of all German troops within fifteen days, not only from the Italian and Balkan fronts, but from all Austro-Hungarian territory. Internment of all German troops, which had not left Austro-Hungary within the date.

EXTRA TERMS OF AUSTRIAN ARMISTICE

(Continued from Column 5) NAVAL CONDITIONS 1—Immediate cessation of all hostilities at sea and definite information to be given as to the location and movements of all Austro-Hungarian ships.

Notification to be made to neutrals that freedom of navigation in all territorial waters is given to the naval and merchant marine of the Allied and Associated Powers, all questions of neutrality being waived.

2—Surrender to Allies and the United States of fifteen Austro-Hungarian submarines completed between the years 1910 and of all German submarines which are in or anywhere hereafter enter Austro-Hungarian territorial waters.

3—Surrender to Allies and United States with their complete armament and equipment of three battleships, three light cruisers, nine destroyers, twelve torpedo boats, one mine layer, six Danube monitors to be designated by the Allies and United States of America.

4—Freedom of navigation to all warships and merchant ships of Allied and Associated Powers to be given in the Adriatic and up the River Danube and its tributaries in the territorial waters and territory of Austria-Hungary.

5—The existing blockade conditions set up by the Allied and Associated Powers are to remain unchanged and all Austro-Hungarian merchant ships found at sea are to remain liable to capture, save exceptions which may be made by a commission nominated by the Allies and the United States of America.

6. The administration of the evacuated territories of Austria-Hungary will be entrusted to the local authorities under the control of the Allied and associated armies of occupation.

7. The immediate repatriation, without reciprocity, of all Allied prisoners of war and subjects of civil populations evacuated from their homes on conditions to be laid down by the commander-in-chief of the forces of the Associated Powers, the various fronts, sick and wounded who cannot be removed from evacuated territory will be cared for by Austria-Hungary personnel.

Leaders of the Italian-born, in expressing both happiness over the news and praise for the soldiers of the nation, disrupted the Austro-Hungarian armies, gave their opinions both publicly and privately.
