Gustafson, Penn Runner, to Enter Training Camp PENN'S badly shattered track team received another setback when it was announced that Marvin Gustafson, the star Red and blue middle distance runner, was to enter the service. This loss, following closely upon the departure of Coach Lawson Robertson into the service, gives Penn a very poor chance to make a showing on the track this year.

Gustafson won the 60-yard indoor national A. U. championship last winter, and was one of the best and most reliable middle-distance runners on the Penn squad last spring. COFFROTH WILL NOT REFEREE BIG FIGHT

Declines to Officiate at Dempsey-Levinsky Show, but Makes Known Plans for Big Benefit Card

LEW GRIMSON MAY WORK

For the first time in thirteen years James W. Coffroth, famous ex-boxing promoter and sporting man, was a Philadelphia visitor. On this occasion he was the guest of James P. Dougherty, the Lehigh promoter, at a testimonial dinner at the Hotel Walton last night.

During Coffroth's many years in the boxing game he has had to referee his first fight. Now it is his turn to referee the most notable boxing show in ring history in the far West, and he always retained his activities in promoting and refereeing. The majority of the two dozen men present were in the interest of Coffroth to officiate, and it was a difficult task for the veteran sportsman to decline. But he didn't hesitate to say the final "No" when the time came.

The selection of the referee is still undecided. William H. Rocap was asked to officiate. Now it is between Matt Hinkle, 151 South and Low Belmont, the regular Olympia official, with everything involving Grimson, the home promoter. He is acceptable to both managers.

The boxing program in this city during "Cheer-Up Week" will be based on boxing men, with James P. Dougherty, of Lehighville, and Harry D. Edwards, president of the Olympia Club, in charge of arranging the various committees and getting the machinery in operation.

Samuel J. Dallas, president of the Middle Atlantic Amateur Athletic Union, was one of the regulars, and speaking as chairman of the "Cheer-Up Week" sports committee, he made it known that he would devote his time to track, swimming, golf, tennis, ball and racing, but concluded it was best to let the boxing men take care of the boxing end of it.

It was suggested the inter-city boxing matches be arranged in order to increase the competitive interest in the show. By matting the best boxing talent in the East with the best in New York, it was argued, this system would be certain to stimulate interest.

Jack Dempsey is the one man who is in demand for the inter-city match with Levinsky. He will be asked to fight a number of times to real fights to aid the war-work campaign fund. Jack Kearns, manager of Levinsky, has placed his protest at the disposal of Coffroth, and wherever Coffroth says he exhibits he will exhibit.

Among those who made speeches were James W. Coffroth, Harry D. Edwards, Promoter James P. Dougherty, Tommie Walsh, Jack Kearns, James Dromm, William H. Rocap, Samuel J. Dallas.
