

### KEYSTONE SOLDIERS VOTING AT CAMP LEE

Commissioners Expect Only One-third of 13,000 to Exercise Franchise

Camp Lee, Va., Nov. 5.—Pennsylvania soldiers began voting this morning at this camp at 8 o'clock. There are 13,000 men from that State in this camp, but the commissioners who are here to direct the election, do not expect more than one-third of this number to vote. The four V. M. C. A. buildings have been designated as voting stations. In each of these there are six voting booths, each presided over by five Pennsylvania soldiers.

The voting commissioners who are conducting the election are P. H. Barbery, of Harrisburg; P. H. Barbery, Harrisburg; and Howard B. McNulty, of Chambersburg. The polls opened at 8 o'clock and will close at 4 o'clock.

John A. Ryan and Delaware voters will vote at the information office at Chambersburg, Pa., on Tuesday. They are given every vote in count which is a citizen of any of the above States to be absent from military duty long enough to enable him to vote.

Ernest N. Platte, of 15 North Merion street, Philadelphia, was included in a list of candidates for Congress who today advanced to first place.

### FEW ELECTION RALLIES IN WESTERN STATES

Strange Campaign Influenced by Wilson Plea and Influenza Epidemic

San Francisco, Nov. 5.—Few election rallies were held last night in most of the western States, and final newspaper advertisements ceased on the strange political campaign. Influenza swept the West as the campaign was opening, and many candidates were unable to make a speech.

The President's appeal for a Democratic Congress is dominating the election fight in some congressional districts, but most of the argument was conveyed to voters in newspapers and circulars.

Nine United States Senators are to be elected in Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon and Wyoming.

Women played a large part in the campaign. In all but New Mexico and Utah they were considered for important offices.

### SOUTH HAS FIFTEEN CONTESTS FOR HOUSE

No Republican Candidates for Senate Seats—Democrats Confident of Victory

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 5.—Fifteen contests in the South for seats in the House of Representatives will be decided in the elections today. Nine of these are in North Carolina, three in Alabama, two in Georgia and one in Tennessee.

Elsewhere over the south Democratic nominees for the House are without opposition, while there are no Republican candidates for the Senate.

In the second Tennessee district, normally Republican, both the Republicans and Democrats are contesting. The two districts in Georgia, seventh and ninth—where Republicans are running normally—are overwhelmingly Democratic, as are the three districts in Alabama, where there are contests.

The Republicans are making determined fights in several districts in North Carolina and claim victory in two or three. Democratic leaders, however, are confident that a full Democratic representation will be returned.

### GLoucester Elects A NEW MAYOR TODAY

Also Chooses Three Members of City Council

The Republicans of Gloucester City are working hard to increase the majority of Governor Walter Edge and David Baird for United States senator in that city today.

There are three members of city council, a mayor and two justices of the peace to be elected on the municipal ticket. The Republicans may elect their entire ticket, although the Democrats are trying to elect a Mayor and a Commissioner-at-large.

David M. Anderson, the present Mayor, who is completing his second term, is seeking re-election on the Republican ticket. David M. Van Hout is the Democratic candidate.

The contest for Commissioner-at-large will be close because the shipyard workers are supporting the Democratic candidate, Frank Breckenridge, who is assistant superintendent of the Pennsylvania plant. Robert Mayhew is seeking re-election on the Republican ticket.

Candidates for Council

Clayton Hancock, president of city council, is seeking re-election on the Republican ticket. He is First Ward and William J. Hyland is Second Ward. Frank S. Gorman and Arthur P. Lee are the candidates on the Democratic ticket.

There are three members of the Board of Freeholders being elected in Woodbury. Samuel H. Leach is seeking re-election on the Republican ticket. There is no Democratic candidate, but Warner Underwood is the Prohibition candidate.

There are three Republican candidates for city council: Clarence B. Taylor, Garret B. Sellenek and Ernest H. Rigg. James H. Morgan is the Prohibition candidate and Taylor, Sellenek and Rigg are also on the Democratic and Prohibition tickets.

The Republican candidate for Coroner is J. Preston Potter, of Clayton, while John L. Treganier, of Woodbury, is the candidate both on the Democratic and Prohibition tickets.

There are three candidates for Mayor: David Baird, Harry Crist, the present surrogate, is seeking re-election on the Democratic ticket. The Republican candidate is Frank D. Pedrick, at present the deputy sheriff of the County and former postmaster of Woodbury.

The contest for this office will be closer than for any other.

The Republican leaders of the County say Governor Edge and David Baird for the long and short terms for the United States Senate will receive about 75 per cent of the vote in the County.

There are a number of the House of Assembly, Coroner and Surrogate being elected in Gloucester County and the indications are that all three candidates will be elected on the Republican ticket.

Dr. Harvey M. Forder, of Woodbury, is the Republican candidate for Assembly and his opponent is William S. Bennett, who is both the Democratic and Prohibition candidate.

The Republican candidate for Coroner is J. Preston Potter, of Clayton, while John L. Treganier, of Woodbury, is the candidate both on the Democratic and Prohibition tickets.
