DEMPSEY EXPECTS TO PROVE TONIGHT WHY WILLARD REMAINS IN WEST WHEN HE IS IN EAST

DEMPSEY HAS CHANCE TO MAKE A SHOWING BEFORE PHILA. FANS

Sensational Heavyweight Fighter and Title Aspirant Will Make Debut in This City Against Battling Levinsky at Olympia Tonight

JACK DEMPSEY will attempt to prove before a Philadelphia audience might that he is the greatest heavyweight in the world and the logical person to fill the championship shoes left vacant by one J. Willard. Jack will mingle with Battling Levinsky for six rounds or less at the Olympia A. A. in the final act of an all-star show. Other noted boxers will appear, but Dempsey is the headliner and the fans have been clamoring for the last two months to see him in action. They will have an opportunity to get an eyeful tonight.

A year ago Dempsey virtually was an unknown. A few straggling reports of his prowess trickled in from the coast, but none was taken seriously. So many heavyweight phenoms had been thrust upon an unsuspecting public that the dope was discounted. However, after walloping Gunboat Smith and Carl Morris in four-round bouts and stopping most of the truckhorse aspirants in the West, the boys out here began to take notice and compare him with Fulton. Before a match was made with Fredward the Ferocious, Dempsey was pitted against Bill Brennan in Milwaukee and Bill bit the canvas in six rounds. That forced Fulton to recognize the new heavyweight and a bout was arranged for Danbury, Conn. The authorities butted in, however, and finally, through the influence of John commissioner of New Jersey, the fracas was put on in Smith, boxing Harrison, N. J.

That one bout made Dempsey. He was not given a Chinaman's chance, but he stepped in and flattened the pugnacious plasterer in eighteen seconds by the split-second watch. Fulton hasn't hit Dempsey yet and it took but five wallops to put the big boy on his back.

Dempsey started out like Terry McGovern and rushed Fulton to the ropes. He landed a left and right to the body and Fulton attempted to clinch. Jack stepped away and shot another right to the midriff and Fredward backed away. They squared off and Fulton tried to lead with a ponderous left, which was easily avoided. Jack ducked under the blow and whipped a left to the body. Fulton winced, dropped his guard and quick as a flash Jack hurled his right to the chin and the fight was over,

AFTER that Dempsey, through his manager, Jack Kearns, tried to get Willard into the ring to battle for the championship. Big Jess, however, refused and said he would not fight until the wer seas over. The titleholder ran out of a match and the public now regards Dempsey as the heavy-reight champion.

Levinsky Suitable Man to Oppose Dempsey

WHEN Willard refused a \$35,000 offer from Jimmy Dougherty to box Dempsey, the Baron of Leiperville looked around for a suitable opponent. Dougherty wanted to show Dempsey in Philadelphia, but did not care to put him against a "set up." Every heavyweight was considered and Battling Levinsky selected from the bunch. The Battler is one of the shiftiest heavyweights the ring has ever seen, and although he has met all of the leading heavies with the exception of Willard and Fulton, never has taken the long count. He has been able to outpoint his foes and is the hardest man in the world to hit. The Battler has every confidence in himself and expects to outpoint Dempsey tonight.

Before the Fulton-Dempsey match Dan Morgan, Levinsky's manager, paid us a visit and delivered the following oration:

"Td like to have Levinsky meet the winner of the big show, but I hope it won't be Fulton. The Battler would have a hard time with the big plasterer, for he has the best left hand I ever saw on a heavyweight, and no one can get away from it. Fred will murder Dempsey and he'll do it with his left hand. As for Dempsey, I would let Levinsky meet him every day in the week rather than spar with Fulton once. Levinsky can beat Dempsey, but not Fulton."

This was before the present match was thought of, but it goes to show that Morgan has a few ideas regarding the outcome of the bout tonight. Dumb Dan has been in the boxing game more than twenty years and is a shrewd judge of fighters. He still believes Levinsky will spring a big surprise and outpoint Dempsey in six rounds.

Jack Britton also picks Levinsky, but it must be remembered that the former welter champion is his stable mate and works with him daily. He may have the proper dope, and again he may not. If Dempsey hits the Battler something is likely to happen, and it is up to the Battler to keep from getting hit.

AT ANY rate, it looks like a real scrap and the spectators will get their money's scorth. A boxer and a fighter always put up a whi livind battle, and that's the dope on tonight's fracas.

Coffroth Anxious to See Levinsky in Action

66T HAVE been in the boxing game a long time," said Sunny Jim Coffroth the other night, "and have seen all of the leading boxers with the exception of Battling Levinsky. For years I have wondered how he could meet all of the big fellows, giving away as high as fifty and sixty pounds in weight, and still outpoint them. I had an idea that Jim Corbett was pretty clever, but Levinsky must have it on him. I will be at the ringside on Wednesday night to see the Battler in action, and I know I have a treat in store for me.

There are others like Coffroth. Levinsky never has weighed more than 175 pounds, yet has taken en men like Tom McMahon, Al Kublak, Jack Dillon, Perky Flynn, Charley Weinert, Jim Coffey, Tony Ross, Bartley Madden, Gunboa' Smith, Jim Flynn, Tom Cowler, Bill Brennan and Carl Morris without serious injury. He outpointed a great majority of them, which made him one of the best drawing cards in the land.

Levinsky always does better with a heavier opponent. The big fellows ure not so fast and the Battler can jab and get away before they get set to land a blow. That hit-and-run stuff is the secret of the Battler's success, and he hopes to make good use of it tonight.

Dempsey, however, is quite clever and may do some of that speedy stuff himself. Jack Kearns says his man will box Levinsky a couple of rounds and then fight until the Battler takes the count. That is the plan of battle, but Kearns figures Dempsey will be able to hit Levinsky as he pleases. If there should be a slip-up and Bat fights according to his form in other big bouts, the new heavyweight will have a hard time in connecting with a sleep-producing wallop.

LEVINSKY is a Philadelphia boy and started here in 1910 under the name of Barney Williams. Nick Hayes says he discovered him and shipped him to Morgan in New York.

Gus Lewis Has Chance to Make Good

THERE is another Philadelphia boxer who will get his first chance to step into the limelight against a top-notcher tonight. He is Gussie Lewis, one of the best youngsters seen here in years. Gussie has improved wonderfully since Johnny Burns took hold of him, and for a long time be has been clamoring for a match with a recognized opponent. As is always the case, however, Gussie was not considered by the local promoters, who would rather feature some out-of-town star than develop home talent. Jimmy Dougherty, however, asked Lewis to select his own opponent, and Dundee

"I want you to watch Lewis closely tonight," said Burns today, "bese I feel sure he will give Dundee the fight of his life. For a long time we have been looking for a chance to show what Gussie really could do we will take advantage of this opportunity. Remember the night he boxed Pete Herman at the benefit show? He gave Pete a good lacing and after that no one would give him a tumble. Tonight he will weigh 126 pounds and will be lighter than Dundee. At that, I believe my man




